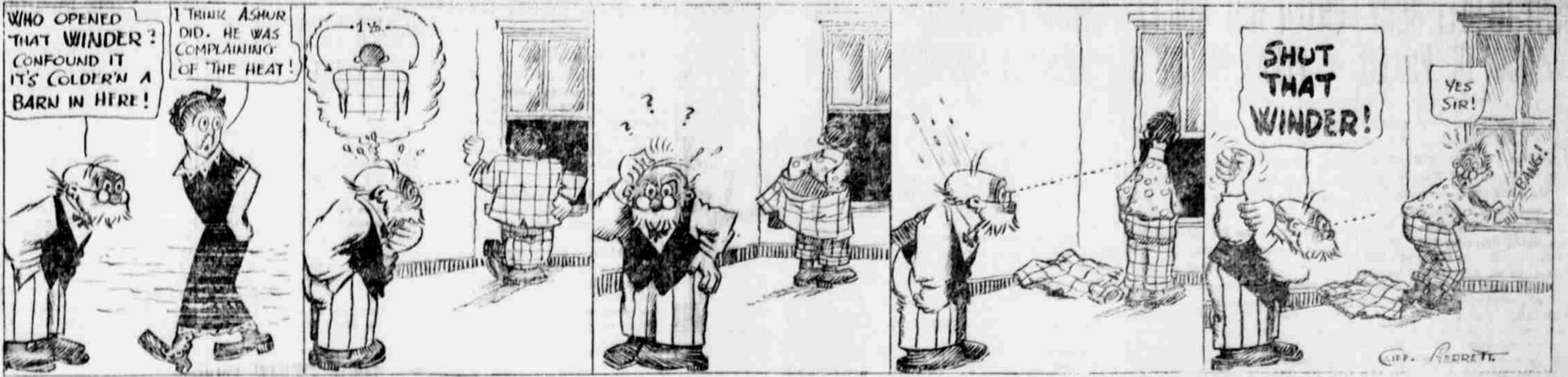

SALEM, Or., Oct. 24.—The short-weight scale and the short measure are doomed if the county sealers of weights and measures carry into effect the provisions of the new law, providing for the inspection of all weights and measures, as instructed by F. G. Buchtel, deputy state sealer, in a pamphlet just issued by him. The law applies to every kind of weight and measure used in commercial dealings.

ASHLAND MAN STRUCK BY A SPENT BULLET

D. M. Lowe had a very peculiar experience Tuesday evening while driving home from town. He was just passing where the old rock crusher used to stand when he heard a whirring sound in the air and almost at the same instant felt a stinging sensation on his left knee. Immediately thereafter he heard something drop to the pavement and upon investigation found it to be a ball from a thirty-two cartridge.
