ROGAWAY SUSPECT ASKS \$10,000 OF WILBUR JONES Suit was filed Friday afternoon in the circuit court by I. H. Wheeler of Marshfield against former Sheriff Wilbur Jones for \$10,000 damages for false imprisonment in 1911, when Wheeler was held for five days in the county jail as a suspect in Nathan Rogaway murder case. Mulkey and Cherry of this city represent the former county official, and Sperry and Hammond of Marshfield the plaintiff. The suit complaint alleges nothing further than the imprisonment, and the Rogaway murder has never been solved. When Fred Seymour alias Parker, sentenced to die for the Deaakalous murder next Friday with Spanos, made his first confession to Sheriff Jones, he said that he killed an unknown man near where Rogaway's body was found at Kingsbury Springs near Ashland, but nothing corroborative of the claim was ever found. Wheeler was held as a suspect for five days, then released, and it is for this that he asks financial succor.
