POTTER'S FATE IN JURY'S HANDS

Following arguments begun this afternoon in the circuit court at Jacksonville in the case of Earl Potter, an Ashland youth, charged with the debauchment of his sister Cecile, the case goes to the jury. The trial, full of sordidness and salacious details is attracting a packed courtroom.

The sister upon the witness stand, denied her first story to the prosecuting attorney and County Judge Tou Velle, and the latter was called to testify. The girl testified that undue influence was exercised to gain her story, which was contradicted.

The principal witness for the state was a woman detective, who by blandishments and appointments said she secured damaging statements from the defendant regarding his relations with his sister.

Potter testified in his own behalf. One sidelight of the case is that several Ashland youths have left to escape being called as witnesses.

prison physician with consulting physicians was in readiness and all entered the death chamber. Accompanied by members of the clergy the doomed men were brought in and took their places on the traps. After final statements and prayer the traps were sprung.

Story of Tragedy

The body of George Dedaskalous, a Greek, who had resided here for six years, was found under a warehouse along the Southern Pacific tracks Monday afternoon, September 23, 1912. The Saturday previously he had drawn out his savings from local banks, amounting to several hundred dollars, and intended to start for his native land the day his remains were discovered, through the antics of a dog.

Dedaskalous had been decoyed to the scene Sunday evening, his skull fractured by blows from a loaded gas pipe, his jugular vein severed by a knife, his clothes torn from his body so that his money belt could be removed. The victim had been killed, the body stripped of valuables and then dragged under the ware house.

Evidence Circumstantial

Shirts stained with blood, the bloody loaded gas pipe, the knife used, were found in the respective lodgings of Spanos and Seymour, who had been last seen with Dedaskalous and were from the first suspected. Complete circumstantial evidence was secured, followed by confessions by each of the accused men in which the other was accused of the crime, each admitting having participated in the murder. These signed confessions were repudiated at the trial.

According to the confessions made, details of which were afterwards verified by the police, several hours were spent in enticing Dedaskalous into a secluded place. He was induced to come by the promise of meeting a woman. While ostensibly waiting for her, Seymour secured a water melon. As Dedaskalous was eating a slice, he was struck over the head from behind by Seymour and knocked insensible. Spanos then repeatedly clubbed the insensible man and cut his throat to make sure of death.

Who Murderers Were

Spanos was a Greek aged about 22, who married a woman twice his age, secured her money, and squandered it. He was accused of practicing white slavery among the Greeks but escaped conviction. Seymour was a half-breed Mexican and a sexual pervert. Both were suspected of the murder of Nathan Rogoway, a hide buyer of Albany, who mysteriously disappeared during the winter of 1911-12 and whose remains were found near Ashland the following spring. Seymour admitted guilty knowledge of this crime.

TEXAS AT ISIS PROVES A WONDER

An emissary from Carranza was expected late this afternoon to submit the rebel's plans and urge that the embargo on arms and ammunition be lifted by the United States.
