

### NEW BASEBALL LEAGUE LAUNCHED

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 1.—The backers of the new Federal league met here today and went over plans for next season. Encouraged by their success last season, the managers considered making the league an eight-club circuit, playing in Baltimore and some other city. Indianapolis, Baltimore, Cleveland, St. Louis, Chicago, Kansas City, Philadelphia and Milwaukee, it was said, will form the circuit.

Tommy Lynch, now a member of the Chicago club, is slated, according to reports, to manage the St. Louis club. George Brown, formerly manager of the St. Louis Browns, attended today's meeting. He will manage one of the clubs next year.

### 1913 ROUNDUP FILMS AT THE PAGE TONIGHT

The 1913 world championship Round-up which will be shown at the Page theatre, Saturday night will be held at Pendleton on the very edge of the Umatilla Indian reservation, the present home of the Umatillas, Cayuse and Walla Walla Indians, who retain their ancient customs, dances, etc., and which are reproduced in the 1913-1914 Round-up pictures. The great broncho busting or bucking contest is the magnet that draws the great rough-riders of America, and the winner of which gains many points toward the all-around cowboy championship of the world and the gold belt that goes with it. A. E. McCormack, of Goldsmith, Wyoming, gained the championship for 1913-14, and his winning ride is faithfully shown in the 1913-14 Round-up pictures.

The 1913 Round-up was held September 11-12-13, and practically every western state was represented, as there were over 200 of the most expert cowboys and cowgirls entered in the different events. The west is known for its activity, but action reaches its very zenith in the Round-up. The three days were filled with excitement, thrills and fun, and folks came from hundreds of miles to see it all, and even New York contributed two cars of Round-up fans.

### GUNBOAT SMITH DEFEATS MILLER

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—Gunboat Smith was considered a real contender for the heavyweight championship of the world here today following his knockout here last night of Charley Miller of San Francisco in the third round of a scheduled ten-round bout.

Miller was outclassed from the start and apparently was out of condition. He was fat and puffy and was breathing hard before the first round had ended. The end was not unexpected, as Miller was dazed repeatedly in the first two rounds, floundering about the ring several times as a result of Smith's punishing wallops.

Smith went about his work calmly and deliberately. He backed Miller into his own corner in the opening session and soon had him reeling from right and left swings. Miller warmed up at the close of the round, but all of his swings were wild.

### PRESS BOYCOTT OF REUTER'S NEWS

LONDON, Nov. 1.—The outlook seemed serious today for Reuter, the big English news and advertising agency which is the European ally of the Associated Press.

The newspapers plainly were indisposed to change the hostile attitude which they adopted toward the agency as a result of its circular, subsequently withdrawn and repudiated, but not until after many editors had seen it, suggesting to advertisers that the company could get advertising matter into the newspapers of the press by virtue of its double role of advertising and news-gathering agent.

The Times published only five Reuter dispatches, totalling 246 words, and the Mail four, totalling 366 words, in place of the dozens which they formerly used.

### BIXBY RANCH BRINGS \$1,750,000

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 1.—Deeds were expected to be recorded here today, completing the sale of the famous Palms Verdes ranch by the Bisby family of Long Beach to a syndicate, said to be composed of New York men.

The ranch comprises approximately 16,000 acres, extending along the coast from San Pedro to Redondo Beach, and the purchase price is reported to be approximately \$1,750,000.

Unconfirmed reports today were that the purchasers represent the National City Bank of New York, and through it the Standard Oil company.

### HOSMER GUILTY OF LIBELING CONVENT

SALEM, Or., Nov. 1.—J. E. Hosmer, editor of the Silverton Journal, who was found guilty by a jury in the circuit court on a charge of criminally libelling the Benedictine convent at Mount Angel, will be sentenced Monday.

The defense introduced no evidence and evidently plans to fight for a reversal of the finding in the supreme court.

The alleged libel was committed in the publication in a pamphlet by Hosmer, of what was purported to be the confession of Mary Laceman, a nun, said to have "escaped" from the Mount Angel convent and containing allegations reflecting on the morals of the institution.

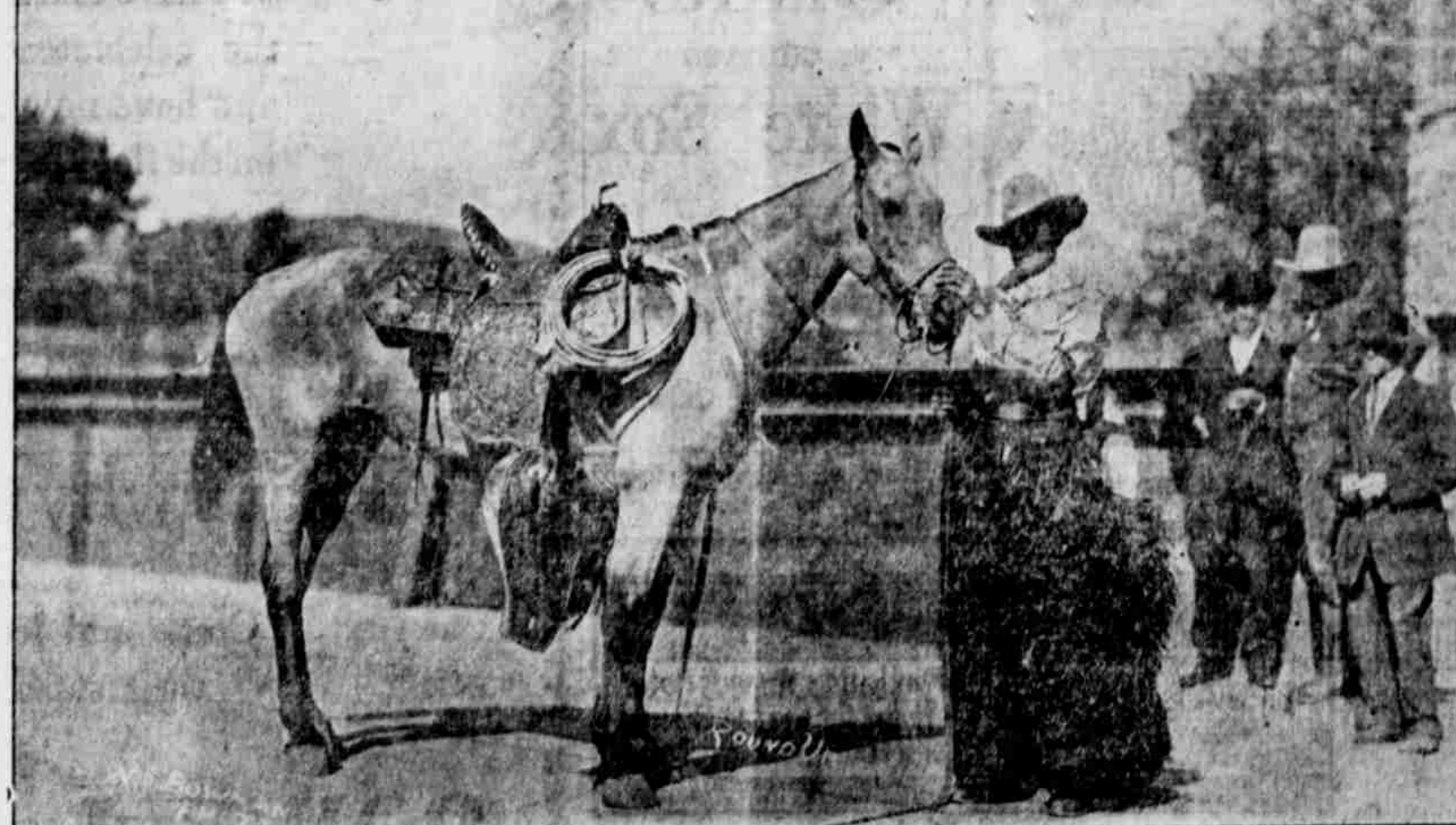
