PLAN ARREST OF ROCKEFELLER

TRINIDAD, Colo., Nov. 4.—Leaders of the striking Southern Colorado miners consulted here today with their lawyer, Louis Hawkins, relative to the swearing out of a warrant charging John D. Rockefeller with murder, in connection with the fatalities which have occurred in fights between mine guards and strike sympathizers since the strike began.

The union leaders have contended all along that Rockefeller, the real power behind the Southern Colorado mine operators, was waging the fight against the men in the hope of crushing unionism in Colorado.

The operators replied that, in the event of an attack on Rockefeller or any of their number, they will swear out warrants for Mother ones, Vice President Haynes of the miners union, and President McLennan of the state federation of labor.

Mob Attacks Tammanyite

The fusionists claim the election of their entire city ticket.

The first violence to mark the election came when a mob threw eggs and vegetables at Clement Driscoll, Tammany leader of the second assembly district, as he was emerging from a booth. He was chased to his home.

Sulzer today visited the sixth district on three occasions, accompanied each time by bodyguards. He said the district was filled with "repeaters and guerrillas."

POOL SALES OF BARTLETT PEARS NET GROWERS \$1.45

PORTLAND, Or., Nov. 4.—Returns for the pool sales of Bartlett pears for the last season have just been announced by leading shipping organizations of the Pacific northwest and they are so much better than usual that growers are naturally much elated.

An advice from Hood River states that the Apple Growers association, an affiliation of the North Pacific Distributors, had secured an average of \$1.34 a box for Waver Bartlett's, ranging in size from 163 and larger. This means net returns to the grower of \$1.24 a box, which is quite a fair average.

The Northwestern Fruit Exchange of this city has just completed its final report of the sale of Rogue River Bartlett's, which were marketed under the Blue Triangle brand. This is considered the best grade of that section. The average price secured for 22,486 full boxes was \$1.601 per box, and for half boxes the sales included 912 packages with an average price of \$1.046 per half box. The net returns to the Rogue River growers for their Bartlett's this season averages slightly better than \$1.45 for full boxes. The full sale of Bartlett's by the organization amounts to over \$45,000 for the Rogue River alone. The price obtained for Rogue River Bartlett pears this season shows the greatest average ever known.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 4.—Thousands of people crowded into the last few miles of the roadway to witness the finish of the Los Angeles-Phoenix automobile race early today, many camping all night in automobiles and wagons by the roadside.

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OLIN DAVIS IN LOCOMOBILE WINS RACE TO PHOENIX

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 4.—Olin Davis, the youthful San Diego driver, today the Los Angeles-San Diego-Phoenix automobile road race. Driving at a terrific clip, Davis, in Locomobile car No. 4, entered the fairgrounds, made the circuit of the track and ended up at the edge's stand at 1:48 p. m. mountain time.

Davis' unofficial time was 18 hours and 30 minutes. Guy Hall, in Marmox car No. 11, was second to arrive at 2:50:30 p. m. Oldfield ran into a buggy between Yuma and Castle Home half an hour after his start this morning, leading to the report that he had been killed. He was uninjured, however, and able to continue the race.
