LARGE CROWD TO GO ON EXCURSION TO GRANTS PASS

Arrangements have been completed for the big rally of Southern Oregon commercial clubs and boosters at Grants Pass tomorrow (Thursday). The Grants Pass Commercial club has requested that the visitors come early, as they have made elaborate plans for their entertainment.

ELECTION RESULTS

THE election furnished a sufficient index of popular opinion to be construed as an endorsement of President Wilson's administration and policies. State elections were held in Massachusetts, Maryland and New Jersey. All are manufacturing states.

The defeat of Tammany gives almost universal satisfaction. It is due principally to Sulzer and indicates very plainly how the people of New York regard the latter's impeachment. Whatever Murphy's capacity as a grafter and city boss, he was not equal to the task of bossing the state.

In Oregon a very light vote was polled. Laws much more important to the people than the election of any person to petty office were at stake, yet with the personal element lacking, the people showed little interest in the election.

All the referendums sustained the legislature, except that on the sterilization bill—defeated by appeals to silly sentimentalism. A hard campaign against the bill was waged—and none in its behalf, hence its defeat due to misunderstanding a measure in advance of its time.
