

### FORTY KILLED BY TRAIN COLLISION SOUTHERN FRANCE

MELUN, France, Nov. 5.—After 16 corpses had been taken today from the debris of the Paris-Marseilles express, wrecked in a collision near here last night, rescuers estimated that the total number of dead would prove to be at least 40. Of the injured there were scores, and it was certain that several of them would die.

Among the victims was Captain Amie, of an infantry regiment in Southern France, who after suffering agonies for ten hours, begged the doctors to kill him when he was at last found, and it became evident that much difficulty would be experienced in extricating him. The physician gave him morphine to stop the pain, and he died, still pinned under the wreckage.

The engineer of the train admitted that he disregarded a danger signal. The express dashed at terrific speed into another train, and seven cars, crowded with passengers, were smashed to kindling wood.

President Poincare and his wife motored from Paris to the scene of the wreck today, and for several hours watched the rescuers at work.

### ONLY EIGHT CARS FINISH PHOENIX RACE

PHOENIX, Ariz., Nov. 5.—Only eight cars out of the 26 which started Monday reached here yesterday in time to qualify in the annual Los Angeles-Phoenix automobile road race. Olin Davis, the winner, made the 574.4 miles over boulevard, mountain and desert in the official time of 18 hours and 49 minutes, nearly three hours ahead of his nearest competitor, on elapsed time for the total distance.

- Rice, driving Simplex No. 23, finished in fourth place after one of the most sensational races on record is car overturned and rolled down a bluff. Calling aid, he got in, right and started away, only to overtake Barney Oldfield, his teammate, who had broken a driving shaft. Carrying Oldfield as a passenger Rice drove into Phoenix in fourth place.

### FIFTEEN CARS RACE EL PASO TO PHOENIX

EL PASO, Texas, Nov. 5.—Fifteen cars today are competing in a 531-mile auto race from El Paso to Phoenix, Ariz., over the Borderland route. Four thousand dollars in cash will be divided among the first four cars finishing within the required time limit of forty hours. The race will end tomorrow at the Arizona state fair grounds. The roads are in good shape and the winning car is expected to better than eighteen hours for the distance. A night control has been arranged at Douglas, Ariz. There are checking stations all along the Borderland route.

### INVITATIONS OUT FOR WILSON WEDDING

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—Invitations to the wedding in the White House the latter part of this month of Miss Jessie Wilson, daughter of the president, and Francis B. Sayre of New York, were issued today. The guest list was kept secret, but it was believed to contain less than 500 names. About half of those invited live outside of Washington. Invitations were sent to the members of the cabinet, the diplomatic corps, the members of the supreme court, and to the wives of some of the senators and representatives in congress. It was reported that the daughters of the foreign ambassadors and ministers and of cabinet officers were not included in the invitations.

### DEMOCRATS WIN IN NEW JERSEY AND BAY STATE

NEW YORK, Nov. 5.—Latest returns from New Jersey indicated that James F. Fielder, the democratic nominee supported by President Wilson, would have a plurality for governor of 18,000 over Edward C. Stokes, republican, and Everett Colby, progressive.

Fielder's vote ran slightly behind what Wilson received a year ago. Colby, it was evident, would not prove to have polled more than a total of 40,000, as compared with Roosevelt's 145,410 when he ran for president.

New Jersey elected a democratic legislature.

Reports from Boston place the plurality of David I. Walsh, democrat, at about 50,000 for the Massachusetts governorship. Charles Sumner Bird, progressive, was in second place; August P. Gardner, republican, was third, and Governor Eugene N. Foss, running independently to succeed himself, was far at the bottom.

Henry C. Stuart went in as governor of Virginia unopposed.

Maryland, which was voting on United States senator, chose Blair Lee, a democrat, and an old college mate of President Wilson, by an easy majority. On state, city and congressional tickets—no governor was being elected—Maryland also went strongly democratic.
