OFF YEAR YIELD 30 ACRES APPLES SELL FOR \$10,804

This is supposed to be an off year for apples in the valley. Here is the record for the off year of the Riverdale orchard, owned by J. F. Morrill, near Gold Hill.

From twenty acres of orchard he packed and sold eleven cars of fruit, or 6930 boxes. Two of these cars were of fancy product—the balance of extra fancy. The fruit was sold cash at Gold Hill for the following prices:

LONDON MARKET LOWER FOR PEARS HIGHER FOR APPLES

The London branch of the Northwestern Fruit Exchange reports the foreign fruit market under date of October 25, as follows:

Pears—Prices lower. Supplies, principally Comice, Bourf, Bose, Goult, Moreau and Winter Nellis, from U. S. A. and Canada continue to far exceed demand. Keifers, which are very popular here, are arriving in large quantities and making good prices. About 10,000 barrels sold this week, principally Keifers. The demand continues good, but with this heavy quantity prices were lower. Winter Nellis selling well, with considerable quantities being placed in storage.

Apples—Canadian barrel stock has done well and prices, if anything, are higher. About 20,000 barrels of Nova Scotia fruit offered, for which the demand was only moderate. Oregon Newtowns have arrived in good condition, but very green, and selling slowly. California Newtowns are now arriving, showing fair to good color, and are selling more freely than Oregon Newtowns, and at a good, and in some markets, better prices. The demand is for stock showing good color.

Oregon Newtowns are a very slow sale and at low prices, principally due to the fact that they are arriving too green. However, good quality fruit showing color is wanted and should do well. We note some Grimes Golden sold at \$1.95@2.10.

BETTER PROSPECTS IN NEW YORK CITY FOR FANCY FRUIT

(Correspondence)

NEW YORK, October 25.—A firmer undertone characterized all lines of deciduous fruits here this week, and price changes favored sellers. Indications are for a continuance of the upward movement, owing to a falling off in receipts, an active demand and the diversion of several carloads from this city to other markets.

The action of the list showed that the demand for fancy grapes exceeded the supply, and so did that of prunes and hard, attractive pears fit for export and of good carrying quality.

Offerings aggregated 114 cars from California and twenty-six cars from the northwest. Interest was chiefly concentrated upon grapes. Arrivals from Florin and Lodi generally lacked color, but they were free from decay and met an expanded outlet.

Arrivals of Winter Nellis promise to be very light during the balance of the season, as advices from California state that some of the largest growers have sold their crops for export, and that several carloads have already gone to Brazil and other Central American countries.

Strictly fancy Valencia oranges made a new record, when the highest price of the season, namely \$11.50 per box, was obtained for Fullerton fruit. The average price, however, slightly favored buyers.

VENICE VOTES TO SHUT OUT BOXING

VENICE, Cal., Nov. 6.—Venice is closed to boxing and boxers today after the first municipal election in the history of California wherein the glove sport was an issue.

By a vote of 543 to 455 an ordinance prohibiting boxing matches and the maintenance of training quarters here was approved. An alternative ordinance permitting four-round contests with eight-ounce gloves was defeated 519 to 478. The campaign against boxing was conducted largely by the women of Venice.

YREKA BANKS AND SISKIYOU COUNTY BUY ROAD BONDS

YREKA, (Siskiyou Co.), Nov. 6.—The Board of Supervisors yesterday unanimously adopted a resolution declaring the intention of Siskiyou county to purchase \$50,000 worth of the state's highway bonds at any moment they may be offered. The two Yreka banks at the same time declared their intention of purchasing a like amount of bonds just as soon as the bonds are put on sale. This is done in keeping with the promise made by the Yreka delegation at Sacramento last week in the appeal to the state highway commission asking that the state highway be routed through Yreka instead of Montague. The commission favored Yreka and now Yreka and Siskiyou county will keep the pledge then made.

Siskiyou county was the first in the state to agree to build all the bridges that might be required along the line of the new highway. Now it has blazed the way for the other counties in this part of the state. While some counties down south and around the bay have agreed to purchase highway bonds, no county in the superior part of the state, as far as is known here, has taken the step in advance that Yreka and Siskiyou took yesterday.

It is expected here that work on the highway in Siskiyou county will begin right away.
