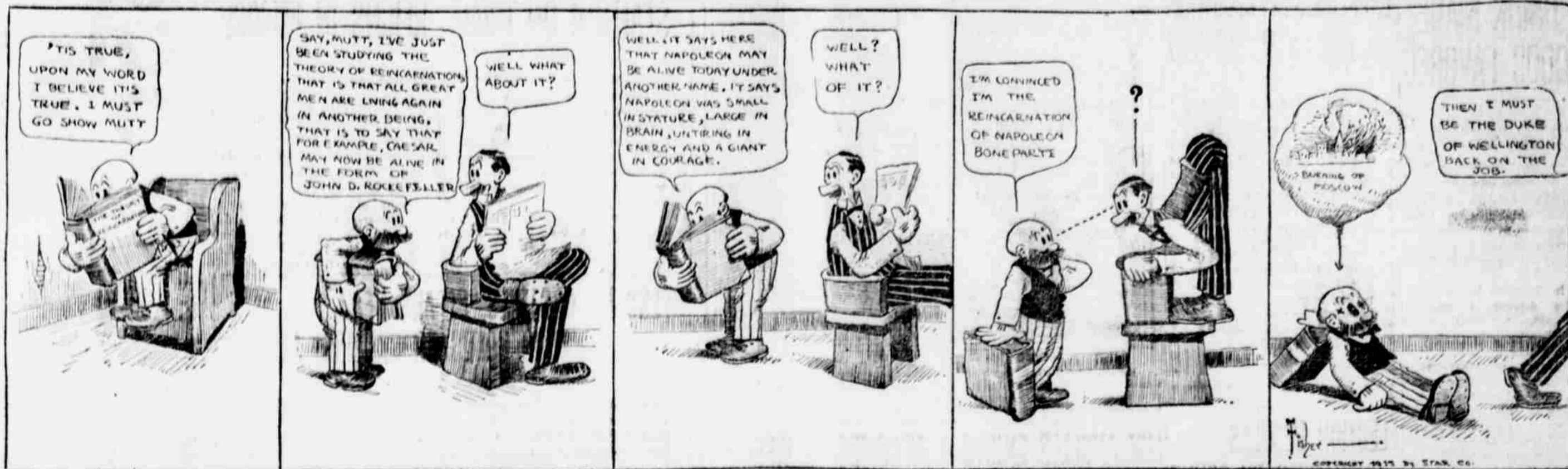


Oh, Yes! Jeff Believes in the Theory of Reincarnation
