

UNIVERSAL LABEL FOR UNION MADE GOODS FAVORED

SEATTLE, Nov. 6.—The movement to establish a universal label was reported on unfavorably at a meeting of the union label trade department of the American Federation of Labor, which met at labor temple here today as a preliminary to the opening of the thirty-third convention which meets next Monday.

Meeting in the same building, the metal trades department received resolutions asking for local control and more solidarity between unions affiliated with this body.

John W. Hayes, secretary-treasurer of the International Typographical union, presided over the label trade meeting in the absence of President John W. Tobin, who is unable to attend the convention. Hayes read Corbin's report, in which the president said the movement for a universal label was the result of hasty conclusions not borne out by the investigation which has been conducted since the 1912 session. Tobin urged that each union try to popularize its label and support other label-owning organizations.

BORAX SMITH DEFEATS CREDITORS

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 6.—Borax Smith won an important point today in his fight against the creditors who have been seeking to make an involuntary bankrupt of him.

Smith's counsel sought a court order last week requiring a full investigation of the claims against their client before going on with the bankruptcy proceedings. Federal Judge Dooling sustained this motion on every point made by the Smith lawyers.

In announcing his ruling the court expressed a doubt whether enough creditors had joined in the petition, whether their claims aggregated the amount required by statute, and whether the controversy between them and Smith ought to be settled in the manner they desired.

These points are to be determined through a full hearing at which the value of the securities held by the creditors will be investigated. A date for the hearing will be set later.

ELECTION RESULTS UNCHANGED BY COUNT

Five precincts—Barron, Lake Creek, Flounce Rock, Meadows and Union up to this afternoon have failed to report the returns of the referendum election Tuesday, but are expected to arrive in time for the official count which is scheduled to begin this morning by County Clerk Gardner. These districts will make no change in the result as the vote was small. The women's compensation act was the most popular measure. Watkins, the precinct that voted 23 to 0 against the bond issue, relented somewhat and split on the U. of O. repair bill 18 to 9. The sterilization bill lost in most of the county precincts.

INDUSTRIAL PANIC REIGNS IN MEXICO

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 6.—Business here had reached a point of practically complete prostration today. Many stores have closed up, their sales being too small to warrant the expense of running them.
