Captain Caton, a veteran of the Civil, Mexican and Indian wars and an early pioneer of Rogue River valley, died Thursday noon, November 6, at the home of his daughter, Mrs. F. E. Furry, at the advanced age of 87.

Captain Caton was born in Cuyuga county, New York, January 27, 1826. He was united in marriage to Miss Sybil A. Freeman at Norwalk, O., on November 17, 1847. He served through the Civil war, where he received his captain's commission. He took part in many of the historic battles of the war. When the Mexican war broke out he served through that war. In 1851 he crossed the plains and served in the Indian wars. His life was filled with stirring events of which it would take a large book to record. From 1878 to 1881 he served as deputy sheriff in Jackson county. Captain Caton was a man of progressive ideas. During the equal suffrage campaign he wore a "Votes for Women" button and laughingly said that he would be mascot for the local organization. From the time of the Civil war he was a republican in politics. He is survived by his daughter, Mrs. F. E. Furry of this place, with whom he spent his declining years and a son, Milo Caton, of Willapa, Wash.; also several grand and great grandchildren. His funeral will be held in Jacksonville, Saturday at 2:30 p. m. A service will be held at F. E. Furry's at 11:30 a. m.
