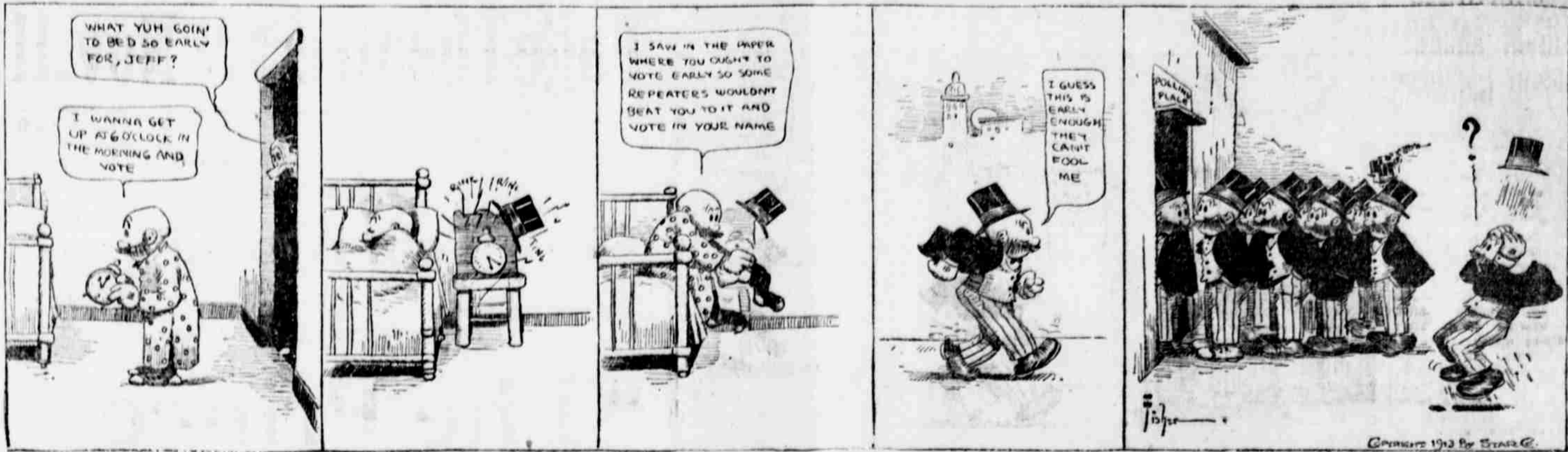


Jeff Voted Early, but Not Early Enough
