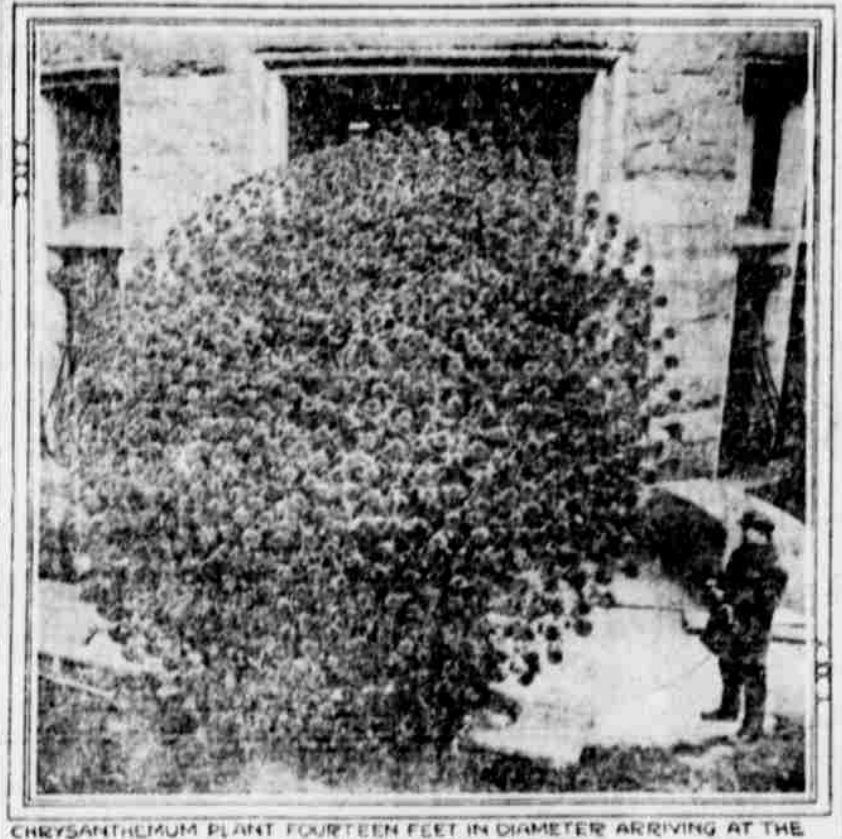

GREATEST CHRYSANTHEMUM PLANT IN WORLD.



CHRYSANTHEMUM PLANT FOURTEEN FEET IN DIAMETER ARRIVING AT THE MUSEUM OF NATURAL HISTORY.

The above chrysanthemum plant, which is exhibited at the Chrysanthemum Show in the Museum of Natural History, New York, is the largest in the world. It is sixteen feet in diameter and more than seven feet in height, and carries more than two thousand blossoms. To move the plants to the Museum special wagons were engaged and mounted policemen escorted each wagon all the way. The process of transportation occupied more than five hours. In order to get the plants into the Museum intact the trussing of one of the doors had to be removed.
