TRY TO CHANGE WELFARE RULING

PORTLAND, Nov. 12.—That an organized effort will be made to secure a change in the ruling of the state industrial welfare commission that no woman shall be employed after six o'clock at night was the belief here today. At a meeting of the commission last night a number of corporations and business firms affected by the ruling protested vigorously. Among the corporations were the Pacific States Telephone and Telegraph company of Portland; the Home Telephone company and the Western Union Telegraph company, who urged that their business was peculiar and that for temperamental reasons it is impossible to dispense with girls as operators.

A few women employees also protested, declaring that they were satisfied with night work.

Resolved, that the city council of the city of Medford, Oregon, that notice is hereby given that it is in the opinion of the city council, necessary, and the city council hereby requires that a concrete sidewalk six feet in width be constructed on the east side of North Central avenue, between Sixth street and East Fifth street.

Resolved, further, that the several owners of adjacent and contiguous lots are hereby required to construct said sidewalk in said manner within thirty days after service of this resolution upon them, in the manner provided by said ordinance No. 29 of said city, passed and approved September 24, 1902.

Resolved, that copies of this resolution be served upon the respective owners of said property in the manner provided by said ordinance with-in five days from date, or as soon thereafter as is practicable by the city recorder or under his direction.

Sealed proposals, addressed to County Court of Jackson County, Oregon, and endorsed "Proposals for Constructing Sixty-four Mountain Section of the Pacific Highway in Jackson County," will be received by the County Court of Jackson County at its office in the courthouse, Jacksonville, Oregon, until 2 o'clock, p. m., on the 19th day of November, 1913, and at that time and place will be publicly opened and read.

All proposals must be made upon blank form to be obtained from the state highway engineer at his office, Masonic building, Salem; must give the prices proposed, both in writing and figures; and must be signed by the bidder, with his address.

Each bid is to be presented under sealed cover and shall be accompanied by cash, a bidder's bond made payable to Jackson county, or a certified check made payable to the

county judge of Jackson county, for an amount equal to at least five per cent of the amount of said bid, and no bid shall be considered unless such cash, bond, or check is enclosed therewith. Such bidder's bond shall be conditioned that if said bid be accepted the party bidding will duly enter into and execute the contract. Should the successful bidder to whom the contract is awarded fail to execute the same within ten days (not including Sunday) from the date of notification of such award, such cash, bond, or check shall be forfeited to Jackson county and the same shall be the property of the county. All other cash, bonds and certified checks will be returned to the unsuccessful bidder who submitted the same.

A corporate surety bond will be required for the faithful performance of the contract in sum equal to one-half of the total amount of the bid. All bids are to be compared on the basis of the state highway engineer's estimates of the quantities of work to be done as follows:

1. 134,428 cubic yards of earth excavation.
2. 21,804 cubic yards loose rock.
3. 43,412 cubic yards solid rock.
4. 13,913 square rods clearing and grubbing.
5. 4,036 lineal feet 12 inch corrugated iron pipe.
6. 40 lineal feet 18 inch corrugated iron pipe.
7. 576 lineal feet 24 inch corrugated iron pipe.
8. 593 cubic yards concrete, class "A."
9. 89 cubic yards concrete, class "C."
10. 70,000 pounds reinforcing steel.

The foregoing quantities are approximate only, being given as a basis for the comparison of bids, and the county court of Jackson county does not expressly or by implication agree that the actual amount of work will correspond therewith, but reserves the right to increase or decrease the amount of any class or portion of the work that may be deemed necessary or expedient by the state highway engineer of Oregon.

Plans may be seen and forms of specifications and contract may be obtained at the state highway engineer's office, Masonic building, Salem; and they may be seen at the office of the resident engineer at Medford.

The right is reserved to reject any and all proposals, or to accept the proposals deemed best for Jackson county.
