GAVE JEWELS TO WOMAN: POLICE FIND \$100,000 BUNCO

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—With the disappearance of a young man who was received in fashionable Fifth Avenue hotels and the discovery by the police of many diamonds in Bowery pawnshops, a diamond swindle amounting to over \$100,000 is believed to have been uncovered. A man with whom the woman formed a partnership for selling the diamonds is also missing. The grand jury will begin an investigation tomorrow. The police activity resulted from the arrest Saturday of Francis Cox, a diamond broker, charged with holding diamonds entrusted to him by another broker, and Cox explained he gave the diamonds to a woman to sell and she had not returned them.

"DRYS" JOLT BRYAN FOR WORK IN LAST ELECTION

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 14.—The convention of the Anti-Saloon league of America adopted a resolution today making a veiled attack on Secretary of State Bryan. The resolution states the federal officers are interfering in state politics and should consider themselves the moral guardians and political sponsors of the men elected through their influence and hold themselves responsible for the men's conduct while in office.
