

### LARGE CROWD TO SEE BIG LEAGUE PLAYERS ASSURED

Interest in the White Sox-Giants game next Monday is beginning to warm up, and two of the greatest ball clubs in the world will be greeted by an estimated crowd of 10,000 if the weather man is kind.

Merchants of the city will close during the game and the Southern Pacific freight office and sheds and baggage room will be closed. John M. Scott, general passenger agent of the line, has wired for grandstand reservations and will arrive Monday to see the game.

Fifteen tickets have been sold from Redding and eight from Sisson. A special price will be given school children. The Evening Herald will run a special from Klamath Falls to see the game.

Word from northern California and southern Oregon today indicates large delegations from points between Roseburg and Redding. Siskiyou county fans sent the following message this morning, and as the game begins at 1 o'clock their train connection fears are groundless:

"Quite a delegation from Siskiyou county has planned seeing ball game next Monday, but train 15 leaving Medford at 4 o'clock will deprive us of seeing the full game unless game starts by 2 o'clock at the latest. Majority of us must return same day. Advise me by wire.

### PLAN TO RAISE RATES FOR METERS

The water committee of the city council denies any intentions of raising the water rents, but admit contemplating the raising of meter rates which amounts to the same.

To this effect an ordinance was read by City Attorney McCabe, making the rates for meters 18 cents per thousand and from 5000 to 50,000 gallons, and 15 cents per gallon for over 50,000 gallons. Afterwards the rates were reduced from 18 to 15 cents, to 15 to 12 cents.

After the reading of the ordinance a general discussion following and it was decided to take no definite action until the council could confer with Superintendent Tranna, and consider his plans for adjusting the tangle.

The water committee consists of Councilmen Mitchell, chairman, Miller and Campbell.

### MRS. CEOL GUILTY; IS FINED HUNDRED

Mrs. William Ceol was found guilty in the circuit court Thursday of assaulting W. C. Daily, a Lake Creek pioneer, with a "nigger" hoe 18 months ago and fined \$100 and costs, the lowest penalty under the law. The prosecution was conducted by Attorney B. F. Mulkey, special prosecutor. Mrs. Ceol's husband was acquitted of a similar charge in November, 1912, with Judge Kelley as the defense attorney. The case has been hanging fire all this time and aroused much interest on Lake Creek.

### MYNATT'S FATE IN HANDS OF JURY

The jury in the case of Henry Mynatt charged with horsestealing, are deliberating on the evidence, and a verdict is expected this afternoon. The case was placed in their hands at noon.

This afternoon a jury is being selected to try Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Kelts of Talent charged with assault with a deadly weapon during a neighborhood quarrel last September.

### INVESTMENT COMPANY OFFICIALS INDICTED

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 14.—Former President A. E. Elder and 10 other former officers of the Los Angeles Investment company, one of the largest corporations in the west, were indicted today by the federal grand jury on a charge of conspiracy to use the mails to defraud.

### POLICE GRAFT IN GOTHAM EXPOSED BY WIRE TAPPER

NEW YORK, Nov. 14.—Startling accusations of police graft made by George McRea, arrested in Los Angeles last month and brought back to New York in connection with a wire-tapping swindle which cost S. R. Jones of Pittsburg \$20,000, were given publicity here today by District Attorney Whitman.

According to McRea, the gang of wire-tappers paid regular salaries for protection to a deputy commissioner, an inspector and a captain of police. The deputy commissioner got \$2500 a month and 20 per cent of the wire-tappers' plunder, and the inspector and captain smaller but handsome sums monthly, together with percentages of the gang's profits.

The exposure to which McRea's story was likely to lead, it was said, promised to rival those which New York recently experienced.

In connection with the graft inquiry, Police Captain Dominick Riley was summoned as a witness before the grand jury today. Riley retired from the force yesterday on account of heart trouble, and it was understood that he intended to go to Europe, which hastened the investigation.

### FIREMEN INJURED ST. LOUIS BLAZE

ST. LOUIS, Nov. 14.—Four and possibly six firemen were buried beneath falling walls here today at a fire which destroyed the warehouse of the H. W. Beck-Hayes Grain Co.

### FEDERATION FAVORS FEDERAL OWNERSHIP

SEATTLE, Nov. 14.—Government ownership and operation of all railroads and coal mines in Alaska are advocated in a resolution introduced before the American Federa-

tion of Labor, by Delegates E. P. Marsh, of Everett, Wash. Trades Council and Thomas Van Leah and J. A. Taylor of the International association of Machinists. The resolution is sweeping and emphatic. It points out that Alaska cannot be properly developed without railroad transportation and fuel and that practically all the land and natural resources of Alaska are still in public ownership it is pointed out. The committee of territories of the senate and public buildings have recommended bills for the construction of railroads and the development of coal lands in Alaska by the government, and both the president and the secretary of the interior have endorsed them. The resolution calls for the passage of those bills. During 1912 there were 1116 strikes in France, in which 267,627 employees were involved.
