PREPARATIONS FOR GREAT BALL GAME MONDAY COMPLETE

Next Monday promises to be a gala day among the baseball fans of southern Oregon and northern California. The weather man says "indications are good." Telegrams are being received daily from outside cities as far south as Red Bluff and Redding and north to Roseburg, indicating wide interest and a large attendance.

The local committee has plans well advanced. If the weather permits about fifteen of the local fans will journey to Ashland Monday morning and bring the entire party, including players, their wives and newspaper men, to Medford in autos. Ben Sheldon has charge of this part of the program. Among those offering their autos for the trip are: Frank R. Tou Velle, Court Hall, Mose Barkdull (two), O. V. Myers, Chas. F. Young, R. W. Ruhl, Lyman Orton, Bob Brevard, J. C. Barnes, H. C. Garnett, R. H. McCurdy and Ben Sheldon.

The game will be called promptly at 1 o'clock. This has been found necessary to enable many of the fans coming from southern points to return on the afternoon train.

Immediately after the game a complimentary luncheon will be tendered the visitors at the Medford hotel. Judge Colvig has arranged this af-

fair. Should any of the fans who have not already made reservations desire to participate, they should see or communicate with Mr. Colvig before tomorrow noon that he may know how many to provide for.
