

I. W. W. THREATENING TO INVADE SIUSLAW FOLLOWING EJECTION

FLORENCE, Ore., Nov. 15.—An invasion of Industrial Workers of the World is threatened here today following the deportation yesterday of nine members of that organization by 200 citizens. The Industrialists were placed on board the launch Beaver and taken to the north spit of the Siuslaw river and after being escorted up the beach for some distance were told to keep going. The deportations were accomplished without disorder and no attempt was made to molest the industrialists.

The Industrial Workers established a headquarters here two weeks ago, but the citizens took no notice of their activities until it was learned they planned importing men to the town.

At a mass meeting of citizens it was decided to deport them.

A number of Industrial Workers who have lived here for some time were allowed to remain upon their promise to renounce allegiance to the organization.

REBELS PLAN TO ATTACK MAZATLAN

NOGALES, Sonora, Nov. 15.—Reports were received here today from reliable sources that a large force of constitutionalists is mobilizing for an attack upon Mazatlan, an important west coast port. The attacking force is well armed and has several pieces of artillery.

It was believed here that the attack would not be made until the rebels were re-inforced by a portion of the constitutionalist command that captured Culiacan.

Altata, near Culiacan, also has fallen before the Carranzistas.

OBITUARY

Rev. J. A. Slover

Rev. J. A. Slover, formerly a resident of Ashland, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. F. Eddy, in Berkeley, Calif., this morning at the advanced age of over 89 years. The remains will be brought to Ashland and laid beside those of his wife in Ashland cemetery. The funeral party is expected here Saturday morning at 7.40 and the funeral services will be held at the Baptist church in this city Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Mr. Slover came to this section in 1881 and left Ashland twelve or thirteen years ago. He leaves four children, two sons residing in Grants Pass, one daughter in Berkeley and one in Spokane.

Mr. Slover was formerly a circuit rider in the early pioneer days.
