who also is acting entirely unofficially, were to get "in touch" with Carranza and to ascertain his plans, his strength and his intentions in the event of success.

The administration was surprised at the statement attributed to Carranza that he demanded the lifting of the embargo on munitions as a right. If he made it, it was believed he did it "for home consumption" and to strengthen him with his own followers.

There was nothing new in the Mexican situation today, Secretary of State Bryan said. He was confident, he added, that Huerta would resign.

The Mexican embassy here asked a full report from Juarez of the report that General Villa had executed many of his federal prisoners there.

The Carranza junta in Washington was confident that the embargo on arms would be raised this week.
