GRANTS PASS AFTER SOUTHERN PACIFIC

GRANTS PASS, Nov. 20.—The papers have been filed upon the Southern Pacific officials in the action being brought by the city of Grants Pass before the state railway commission seeking a reduction of the freight rates on steel rails and structural iron from Portland to this city. This action was authorized by the council some time ago, but before commencing suit the city attorney took the application for the reduction up directly with the railroad company. The attorney addressed a letter to the general manager of the company, stating that the city was building a railroad leading out that ten miles of the grade was now about ready for the rails. That the freight rate of 46 cents per hundred pounds on these rails from Portland to Grants Pass was deemed excessive and asking that the company make a material reduction in the same.

Democrats of the banking committee and republicans and Senator Hitchcock were through tonight with the framing of the respective drafts. The full committee meets tomorrow to decide in what form the report to the senate is to be made.

The democrats adopted an amendment today providing for the refunding of outstanding two per cent bonds and issuing three per cent bonds.

SUPREME COURT RESCUES M'ALLISTER

SALEM, Or., Nov. 20.—Following a precedent established in the case of Dr. Harry Starr, convicted last year in connection with the Portland vice scandal, the supreme court today by a bare majority reversed the conviction of E. S. J. McAllister, charged with a similar crime, and remanded the case to the Multnomah county circuit court for a new trial.

In a dissenting opinion written by Justice McNary and concurred in by Chief Justice McBride and Justice Eakin, the majority members of the court were soundly scored for their decision and for following the principles laid down in the case of Starr, whose conviction was reversed. Starr was afterward permitted to leave the country without trial.

PENNSYLVANIA DAY PROVES A SUCCESS

Forty Pennsylvanians assembled yesterday in their annual gathering and a Pennsylvania dinner in abundance and in quality was enjoyed. J. T. Summerville acted as toastmaster and chairman for the day. TAFT JABS WILSON ON ISLAND POLICY

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Speaking of "holding the Philippines" before the Brooklyn Institute of Arts and Science tonight, ex-President Taft attacked the policy of the Wilson administration as demonstrated in the act of Governor General Harrison since he assumed office early last month.

In taking exception to Wilson's policies in granting more powers to Philippine politicians, Taft declared this action so far in advance of the time of even the approach to self government. "Are we to let those islands go and turn them to the oligarchy of eloquent and attractive orators who really believe in aristocracy and have no real conception of the civil and individual liberty and certainly no capacity for successful popular government" asked the speaker.

He declared that "the minute the strong background of a powerful government is withdrawn, difficulties between the Moros and Filipinos will develop. When his representatives learn the truth concerning the islands and communicate to President Wilson I am confident he will direct them to retrace any steps which have led them away from the course marked out by McKinley and continued successfully down to March, 1913.
