

TO FORM CLUBS PROMOTE PLANTING OF SHADE TREES

So much interest has been manifested in the subject of rose planting, taken up by the civics section of the Greater Medford club, that it has been decided to widen the scope of this work by the formation of neighborhood clubs in every section of the city.

These clubs will have as their object the beautification of their own neighborhood by uniform planting of trees, shrubs and flowers. It is very discouraging to a person who admires an unbroken line of green parking to have his neighbor plant his strip with pink roses and the next door neighbor put holly bushes in the same strip. All these difficulties could be decided in a club that could not be adjusted otherwise.

But the greatest advantage to be gained by forming the whole city into clubs will be the possibility of wholesale ordering of plants and bulbs. The civics section plans to take charge of the ordering, and find that by getting orders for roses in thousands lots it will be possible to buy fine, rooted rose bushes that will be covered with blossoms almost from the time they are planted, for less than one-third of the market price.

Hugh Dickson rose bushes, two years old, guaranteed, cost, if ordered singly, 50 cents each. By clubbing together it will be possible to get them for around 15 cents, and other standard varieties for possibly less.

The subject of tree planting in the parking strips is a very serious one that should be gone into very thoroughly. Parking strips should contain trees and those of the variety best adapted to the soil of each locality. Some very valuable information has been gained on this subject by a tree planting committee whose records are in possession of the civics section. These records, combined with a soil survey of Medford, will be given to each neighborhood club, who can then decide upon the variety of shade trees best adapted to its particular locality.

Again one sees the benefit of co-operation in buying, for the best varieties of shade trees ordered in hundreds and thousands can be obtained for less than one-third the usual market price of the single order.

The civics section contemplates raising a sufficient sum of money to offer substantial prizes to the neighborhood making the greatest improvement in a year's time. Possibly there will be prizes for individual yards also, these prizes to be given by the neighborhood clubs.

A. G. Fuller, a Grants Pass garage operator, accused of a statutory crime involving the same girls, is being heard this afternoon.

In connection with the trial, it is hinted about the courthouse that Beatrice Kavanaugh, in a fit of despondency, tried to commit suicide in the county jail last Saturday. She was carried into the courtroom to testify.

The girls were the principal witnesses against the men, and told of the trip to Ashland. Throughout they showed an inclination to protect the men. Their own situation they failed to view seriously. The Medford W. C. T. U. attended the trial and will help in correcting the ways of the maids who have led a somewhat giddy career the last three months.

She was released under the "cat and mouse" act to prevent her from starving herself to death, but was to have been re-arrested as soon as she regained her strength, if she had not gone to France and subsequently to the United States on a lecturing tour.
