

# LOVE EPISTLES BRING FULLER PENITENTIARY

Missives Written Beatrice Kavanaugh Upset Defense and Cinch Case Against Automobile Mechanic—Girl Testifies Against Defendant.

Parents of Girl Appear in Prisoner's Behalf and Against Their Daughter—Wife Tragic Figure of Case.

A. G. Fuller, formerly an automobile machinist of Medford, now of Grants Pass was found guilty this morning on a statutory charge against Beatrice Kavanaugh, a sixteen year old girl, whose fall, she testified on the witness stand, was accomplished by him when she was but 13 years old. The girl told of their relations since. She is now in the Sacred Heart hospital suffering from the effects of a nervous breakdown.

The tragic figure of the trial is Mrs. Fuller, wife of the defendant, whose faith in her mate was unshaken, until yesterday when she heard letters read from Fuller to the girl whom he called "Babe," that teemed with love, and at time bordered on the salacious suggestive.

Parents Against Daughter Fuller in defense maintained that he viewed the Kavanaugh girl as a sister and that all his intentions were honorable. The Kavanaugh's father and mother appeared for the defendant, and against their own child.

Fuller was a prolific letter writer. Epistles he sent to the girl and her parents were read as evidence. In one the mother of the complaining witness is called "sweetheart."

When Beatrice fled with Myrtle Hanscom, Fuller was under a heavy strain and wrote to Flossie Kavanaugh at Portland urging her to induce Beatrice to return to him. The letter is as follows:

One of Many Epistles Grants Pass, Oct. 1, 1913. Flossie Kavanaugh, Portland, Ore., Dear Friend:

Your letter received and although you be a strange woman to me I feel that I know you, through Mrs. Charles Kavanaugh and the folks, and you don't know how glad I was to hear from you, and that you had seen Babe. I have loved Babe for several years, ever since she was a little girl, and I have done everything I could for her. When she left home I begged her to stay just a few weeks longer at home, and I would be in shape to help her some, and perhaps go with her, and she promised to write me at once.

Details Sacrifices I went to jail for her and I lost the sale of the garage here, by which I would have netted enough to want anywhere with her. Why would she turn me down, and never write when I have hardly slept since she left, and my nerves are all unstrung I can't see. If you ever see her again tell her for God sakes to write me even if she don't love me, and if she does to wire collect this message: "You can get work in Portland, if you want," and tell her to sign any name she wants, and I will come at once, and meet her at your address.

Promises Future Help I can get work there in Portland and will take care of her. It was not her folks that had me arrested. It was the other little girl's father, Charlie told me when he came to the jail to see me that if I had taken Babe and skipped with her, they never would have said a word, because they knew I would take care of her, so I made a compromise with her folks, that if Babe still loves me as she did, tell her that it is all right, and I will forgive her everything, if she still cares. Write me as soon as you get this even if you

don't see her. Your letter made me feel lots better, but I am broken-hearted as it is.

Ever your friend, A. G. FULLER. P. S. Thank you a thousand times for your kindness, and when ever I come to Portland I shall come and see you.

## ASHLAND BURGLARS BROUGHT FROM COOS

A. L. Irwin returned Sunday night from Marshfield, Ore., bringing with him Jack Miller and Joe Howard, who are charged with having burglarized the store of Thos. H. Simpson a couple of weeks ago. They were arrested at Sumner, some distance up the river from Marshfield, by the chief of police of that city, who went up the river and took them in the beds at 3 o'clock in the morning. The men are both known at Roseburg, Miller having waited on table at one of the hotels there. He also played ball at Medford one or two seasons recently. Howard had been around Roseburg some time and had been a horse trainer. They had spent the money taken and had sold 27 of the knives to a man named Brett in Marshfield, who informed the police. Mr. Irwin says that when they were arrested they had nothing to say. They were given a hearing before Judge Hurt Tuesday and bound over to the grand jury.—Ashland Tidings.

## FINAL PLANS FOR CURRENCY BILL FIGHT

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Final preparations were made today for a battle over the administration currency bills all based on the same general theory, and will be placed before the senate by the divided banking committee. Unable to agree on the amendments the committee will present the glass-Owen bill as originally endorsed by the administration and passed by the house.

The measure with the amendments assumed to be acceptable to President Wilson will be submitted by chairman Owen and five other democrats. The bill materially changing the structure of the house measure will be presented by the Republicans and Senator Hitchcock.

All the bills contemplate issuing currency secured by prime commercial paper. The Democrat steering committee meets tomorrow to arrange a program for debate and determine how the bills shall be handled on the floor. The debate is expected to open early next week.
