

DIRTY TOWN IS SUREST MARK OF A DIRTY PEOPLE

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 21.—"Dirty People, and Dirty Towns," is a subject handled with out gloves by Dr. J. N. Hurty, state health commissioner, in an article prepared today for the United Press.

"The reason we have so many dirty towns is because there are so many dirty people," said Dr. Hurty. "Shall the dirty people be compelled by law to be clean? No, indeed, not unless their dirtiness threatens the health and comfort of others. The scripture says: 'He who is filthy let him be filthy still.' Of course, what is the use to do otherwise. Compelling him who is filthy to be clean in person and premises will not make him clean in mind and soul. He will be filthy still. We must teach cleanliness to the unclean. Then if they become clean and stay clean, it is because cleanliness is their nature.

"The town is a mirror. It reflects the people. A man who is clean in mind will be clean in person. He will have a clean front-yard and a clean backyard. A littered dooryard and a dilapidated house reflects a littered and dilapidated mind.

"The reason we cannot make a silk purse out of a sow's ear is because it is a sow's ear. It is not silk. A naturally dirty man can not be made a clean man. Dirty towns will exist as long as the dirty people exist. We must start our future citizens right by giving more time to instructing young school children of evil results of the crime of dirt."

CRAZE FOR RAG MELODIES DYING

CLEVELAND, Ohio, Nov. 21.—That the taste for "ragtime" is dying out was the belief of the managers of the municipal popular concerts, following the record breaking attendance at the initial concert of the season some days ago and at ensuing concerts. The "Pop" concerts are as distinctly a Cleveland institution as they are an institution in Boston. The city has contracts with a large orchestra, composed of Cleveland musicians. They played in the parks this summer and entertained thousands—but no with "ragtime." They played mostly classic selections with a few "popular" pieces mixed in. But that was a free concert.

When the season for indoor concerts opened this month in the Hippodrome with seats at 25 cents each and the announcement was made that no "ragtime" and only a little "popular" music would be on the program, the success of the "Pops" was regarded as doubtful by many. But the attendance at the concerts so far has dispelled all doubts as to the concerts' future popularity and caused Herr Timmer, the director, to declare his belief that the craze for "ragtime" was dying and that "real music" was again coming into its own. The "Pop" concerts are Sunday institutions and are furnished to the people of Cleveland at cost.

DEEP SNOW IN CRATER LAKE PARK

KLAMATH FALLS, Nov. 21.—H. E. Momyer, assistant superintendent and head ranger in Crater Lake National Park, returned to this city yesterday after being driven from the government headquarters by the sudden appearance of winter.

He says the storm of the past few days has brought real winter in the park and that, while there was less than a foot of snow at the headquarters when he left there Tuesday morning, it had begun to snow in earnest, and he deemed it advisable to get out before it got any deeper. He thinks there is at least two feet and a half there now, as it has been threatening in the valley with mists of snow and some rain, indicating that it was snowing hard in the park.

Mr. Momyer is the last person to leave the headquarters. Everybody else had left there several weeks ago, although he declared it had been beautiful with little falling weather most of the time for the last month and a half, since the general traffic has been closed, winter has now begun in earnest. The headquarters and camps are all closed now and will not open again until next spring.

MADERO BROTHERS SEEK REFUGE WITH AMERICAN CONSUL

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 21.—Confirmation was received of a story that Daniel and Evaristo Madero, with several of their friends, charged with political offenses, but out on bail, took refuge in the American consulate at Vera Cruz when summoned before General Maas, the military commander there, and that United States Consul Canada had telegraphed to Washington for instructions. It was not known definitely, however, that General Maas had asked for their surrender.

Rumors concerning the course General Maas has been ordered to pursue in the event of a landing of American marines at Vera Cruz conflicted absolutely. One version was that Huerta had told him to resist as long as he could; another had it that he was not to interfere and to retreat with his forces toward the capital if necessary.

NO NEW YEAR'S RECEPTION FOR WHITE HOUSE CALLERS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—By the announcement here today that there will be no New Year's reception at the White House, President Wilson broke a precedent which has stood for 100 years. Instead, the president said he would leave Washington for a "brief holiday vacation."

FUEL AND MONEY FAMINES THREATEN MEXICAN CAPITAL

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 21.—A fuel famine threatened the Mexican capital today.

Of coal there were less than 1000 tons in the city, and it was impossible to get more. Of oil there were but 24,000 barrels. It was all there was to be had, for the rebels control the Tuxpan region, whence it is obtained. Three concerns controlled the entire supply on hand and they were boosting the price steadily.

Business was practically suspended. There was no work. Hundreds of business men were bankrupt. Thousands of persons were starving. The streets swarmed with beggars. Numberless families which had never before known anything but comfort and even luxury suffered from cold and hunger.

MARINES MAY LAND IN MEXICO PROTECT COWDRAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—Responding to Lord Cowdray's appeal for American protection of the British Pearson syndicate's Mexican interests, Admiral Fletcher, commanding the United States naval force off the Mexican east coast, might land marines, it was admitted here today.

But this would not necessarily be an act of war, it was added. Precedents were pointed to, in which just such a proceeding was not so construed. If marines were landed, perhaps it would be for "police duty" it was stated.

It was expected that Fletcher would represent forcibly to General Aguilera, commanding the rebel forces in the Tuxpan region, that foreign property must be respected, and if Aguilera defied him, that he would act at once.
