VAGRANT WOMAN CONFESSES MURDER MARSHALL FIELD, JR.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 24.—Mrs. Vera Scott is near collapse in the county jail here today as the result of her sensational declaration that she shot and killed Marshall Field, Jr. at a notorious Chicago resort five years ago. Continuous repetition of her story and efforts of examining officers to confuse her in cross examination caused hysteria yesterday and it was necessary to administer sedatives.

The Los Angeles police admitted that they were at sea regarding the story Mrs. Scott told. During her recitals she has contradicted herself persistently, but she has remained firm regarding the main features of her original narrative. A complete copy of this has been telegraphed to the Chicago police, who were asked for instructions.

Mrs. Scott is held here on a vagrancy charge. Since she was taken to jail Thursday she has startled the police with several weird yarns. Late Saturday she told that she was Mrs. Reese Prosser, who shot and killed her millionaire husband two years ago on a train near Libby, Mont. It was while discussing this affair that she launched into a recital regarding the death of young Field. At first Mrs. Scott declared she shot Field with a revolver she drew from his trousers' pocket. Later, under questioning, she claimed that the weapon was discharged accidentally during a scuffle.

Chief of Police Sebastian said today that he has received no reply to his messages to the Chicago police regarding the affair.

After a long rest today Mrs. Scott exhibited a change of heart, and denied vehemently that she had said she killed Field. She declared that she had made no statement concerning him, and that she had nothing to say.

Asked what she would do if the Chicago authorities compelled her to go there to face a charge in connection with the affair, she laughed and said: "They never would dare; I would tell some stories concerning other well known Chicago men that would make their hair stand up."

PORTLAND TO PLACE BAN UPON TANGO

PORTLAND, Nov. 24.—The Tango may be removed from hotels and dance halls, according to Musical Dance Inspector Flaek. Flaek is seeking information from dancing teachers whether the new steps violate the city ordinance, which fixes a certain position to be assumed by all couples in dancing.

PACIFIC HIGHWAY COMMEMORATION PEACE CENTENARY

SEATTLE, Nov. 24.—How best to commemorate 100 years of peace between the United States and Canada, was discussed at a joint meeting of a committee from British Columbia and a committee of the Pacific Highway association here Sunday at the home of Samuel Hill.

The proposition receiving the most support provides for the building of an arch at Niagara and the eastern and western most highways connecting the two countries, and the erection of a small peace monument at every international highway crossing the boundary line.

It is probable that this plan will be endorsed when the committees meet again at Vancouver, B. C., next Wednesday night.

At this meeting memorials will be drawn up which will be sent to the congress of the United States and to the Canadian parliament asking them to appropriate \$250,000 each to carry out the plan. Memorials will also be sent to all organizations interested.
