

FULLER GIVEN 3 TO 20 YEARS IN PENITENTIARY

A. G. Fuller, convicted of a statutory crime against Beatrice Kavanagh, age 16 years, last Friday, was sentenced to serve from three to twenty years in the state prison by Judge F. M. Calkins of the circuit court. Fuller will probably be taken to Salem this week. Attorney Calkins, who defended him, said this morning his client would be liberated in two months.

Fuller made a statement to the court in reply to the query if he had anything to say. He said he felt some of the jurors were prejudiced, and that he might be able to put a different light on some of the damaging evidence. He also said his trial had been fair. His attorney also asked the court for leniency in a short address.

Fuller's wife, whose faith in him is unshaken, is grief stricken at the turn of circumstances. The prisoner formerly lived in this city and is well known. He owns a garage at Grants Pass.

Beatrice Kavanagh, the girl in the case with Myrtle Hanson, will be placed in the Home of the Good Shepherd in Portland, and it is understood relatives plan to object to this procedure. The Hanson girl's mother, Mrs. Mike Spanos, is said to be in Sacramento.

SAM HILL COMING TO BREAK GROUND PACIFIC HIGHWAY

Governor West and members of the state highway commission will be present and assist in starting the first actual highway construction under state supervision in Oregon.

Before the ceremony, the Ashland Commercial club will tender a luncheon at the Oregon hotel to Mr. Hill and the state commission, and then proceed in autos to the point where construction begins, some twelve miles south of Ashland. About thirty Medfordites are expected to attend. Keasel & McDowell, the contractors have already begun to ship material, a carload of scrapers arrived Monday.

SCHOOL BOARD FIXES SCHOOL LEVY AT 10 MILLS

At a meeting of the school board yesterday a tax of ten mills, the same as last year was levied, and as long as no taxpayers took interest enough to be present there were no protests.

The school board members declared they needed more money this year but because of the increase in the city levy and the increase in the state levy they did not feel justified in ordering an increase for city schools.

This ten mill tax raises \$60,000 and there will be \$5,000 from the state. With the sinking fund to provide for the board declares it will be necessary to curtail expenses during 1914 in some way the exact saving having not been determined upon.

EXPECT BATTLE WITH FEDERALS VICINITY JUAREZ

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 24.—With General Villa's rebel force of 6000 men deployed along a twelve-mile front twenty-five miles south of here, confronting a Mexican federal army estimated at all the way from 4000 to between 5000 and 10,000, an air of tense expectancy prevailed in Juarez, across the Rio Grande from here, today.

A battle was expected, but hour after hour passed with no news from the front. General Villa, though he spent last night here arranging for the provisioning of his men, had returned to the line of the looked-for fight. Practically his entire force had been withdrawn from Juarez.

It was plain that the rebel commander expected a decisive engagement.

What delayed it was not clear. The theory of the rebels here was that the federals were again in retreat toward Chihuahua City. Advancing toward Juarez, it was asserted, they were within eighteen miles of the town before Villa moved out to meet them. As soon as he assumed the aggressive, the rebels said, the federals fell back about seven miles. From this the rebels formed the conclusion that the advance was a sort of feeling-out movement and that the federals' stopping point would be nowhere short of their Chihuahua City intrenchments.

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
