A deep silence fell upon the room as the minister pronounced the words that joined the couple in wedlock. As the minister uttered his "Amen," and after he congratulated the bride and bridegroom, and wished them God-speed, the President and Mrs. Wilson greeted Mr. and Mrs. Sayre as they stood upon the dias. They then passed into the blue room.

For more than an hour the guests filed by the couple offering them their congratulations as they passed into the blue room where they were received in turn by the president and Mrs. Wilson. The line led through the red room and into the state dining room where a buffet luncheon was served.

The guest list included members of the president's cabinet, the supreme court of the United States, members of the diplomatic corps, the army and the navy, the senate and house of representatives, resident society, many kinsmen of the Wilsons and the Sayres, and friends and relatives of both families. Nearly 800 were present at this, the largest wedding in the history of the white house.

**FAST CURE DOCTOR IS DENIED AN APPEAL**

OLYMPIA, Wn., Nov. 25.—For the third time the state supreme court today ruled against Mrs. Linda Burfield Hazard, the "starvation doctor," in her appeal from the sentence of from two to twenty years in the penitentiary imposed by the Kitap county superior court for causing the death by starvation of Miss Claire Williamson, a wealthy English patient, over two years ago.

The supreme court previously sustained the lower court and denied a rehearing. Today Chief Justice Crow denied a writ of error, permitting her to appeal to the federal supreme court.
