

### HOSPITAL FAIR IN FULL SWING MANY BARGAINS

The hospital fair is in full swing at the Davis building, next to the office, today. An air of festivity pervades the place, and despite the work yet to be done the whole appearance of the lower floor is one of splendor. Palms and ferns with wreaths of holly and great festoons of Scotch broom have transformed an empty building into a southern garden. The booths are gay and festive in their bright colors, with the wonderful assortment of fancy work adding almost pagan splendor to the whole.

Hundreds of incandescent lights donated by the Southern Oregon Electric company, who did all the wiring free of charge, will transform the whole building into a glittering fairyland at night.

Mr. Vance of the Home Telephone company has donated and installed a telephone, the number of which is 939.

Matthews & Sons donated one day's drayage and Eads Bros. moved the two pianos free of charge. One of these pianos was loaned by the Hale Piano company, the other by the Palmer company.

The California-Oregon Power company put in two electric stoves for use in the kitchen and furnish the power free.

Delphine, the real baby doll, is occupying the place of honor in the baby booth. She will be used to demonstrate the proper handling and dressing of an infant.

Pierce, the florist, has loaned a whole wagon load of palms, which add much to the attractiveness of the booths. The beautiful appearance of the booths is due almost entirely to the efforts of H. G. Helwig of the Medford Furniture & Hardware company. He has worked early and late and most untiringly.

The Medford Furniture & Hardware company gave St. Mary's academy booth a beautiful mission china closet, which will be raffled off. In it is the display of hand-painted china which was done by the artist sister of the St. Mary's academy. Mrs. Hall of the Western China company donated a creamer and sugar, and Mrs. J. D. Ball of the Nash hotel has painted a gorgeous pitcher, almost two feet high, in conventionalized grapes in dull green and purple, on which chances will be sold.
