True Burns won the decision and won by a wide margin, but it was equally clear that had he shown his old time form he would have stowed away the San Francisco.

A stinging left jab won the bout for Burns. McCarthy's peculiar shoulder defense, by which he keeps his jaw buried in the muscles of his left arm, kept Burns from bringing into play his right cross with any degree of accuracy. He started this punch a dozen times or more but it usually landed on the side of the San Francisco's head.
