

FAKE ORCHARD LAND PROMOTERS TRIAL RENEWED

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 28.—The government today started the second half of its case against Frank Richet and J. T. Conway, being tried in Federal Judge Bean's court on a charge of conducting fraudulent operations through use of the mails. It developed shortly after J. T. Conway became manager, that the lands were of scarcely any value however, the company secured the right to sell several large sections of Wallowa, Union and Baker counties. Most of these lands were secured by sale contract with C. A. Hibbard.

Graham Duke Hart, cashier of the Lumbermans National Bank today testified positively that his institution had refused to act at any time as escrow agent for the Veason deeds.

United States Attorney Reames then stated that the government had already shown that the company in its literature had made the statement that the deeds to these lands were held in escrow in the Lumbermans National Bank in Portland.

Miss Ella O'Gara, former stenographer for the Development company, recalled to the stand, identified letters and advertising matter sent out in promoting the sale of contracts for the Hibbard lands in Baker Wallowa and Union counties. One of the pamphlets had a picture in colors on the front page of three big Oregon apples.

"The apples were bought in the market here," related Miss O'Gara in telling how the engraving came to be made.

KID WILLIAMS WINS ANOTHER HARD BOUT

MILWAUKEE, Nov. 28.—Kid Williams of Baltimore has another victory to his credit today as a result of his ten-round no-decision contest here yesterday with Dick Lodiman of New Castle, Pa. Lodiman brought the spectators to their feet in the third round when he sent Williams to the mat with a short left jolt to the chin. Williams retaliated in the sixth with a stiff right to the jaw, which sent Lodiman sprawling. The bell saved him from a knockout. Lodiman, for the remainder of the contest, covered up and hung on to save himself.

VILLA CELEBRATES VICTORY BUT PLANS MARCH TO FRONT

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 28.—General Villa took time for a review of his rebel troops today, in celebration of their victory at Tierra Blanca, but even while it was in progress he was giving orders toward hastening the departure of his forces for the southward, first to attack Chihuahua City and then to move against the Mexican capital.

He said he thought they could leave Juarez tonight or Saturday, but many people believed he would be unable to complete his preparations before Sunday or Monday.

The citizens of Juarez were extremely anxious to see him go, for the dispute between the soldiers, who wanted to make purchases in rebel money, and the local merchants, who refused to accept it, was growing very bitter.

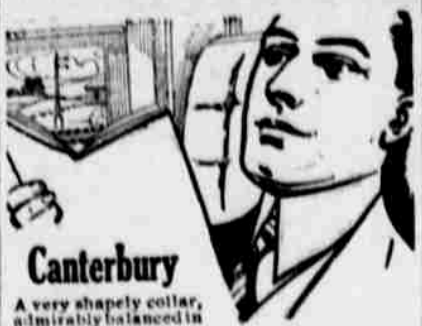

SHANK RESIGNS; UNION FRIENDS TO STRIKE MONDAY

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 28.—Mayor Shank of Indianapolis resigned today. He did so as a result of differences of opinion concerning the handling of the recent streetcar strike and another one threatened by local teamsters. The mayor was criticised for not acting more vigorously against the strikers. The strike of teamsters and chauffeurs was ordered to begin Monday.

Charging that he was unfairly friendly to the unions, local business men gave him his choice between averting the walkout, resigning or being impeached. Shank tried to secure arbitration, failed and resolved to quit. Succeeding him, City Comptroller Harry Wallace becomes acting mayor. He has promised to use the police force energetically to keep order and protect strikebreakers.
