WHITE HOUSE BRIDE OFF ON EUROPEAN TRIP

HOBOKEN, N. J., Nov. 29.—With hands playing and colors flying, the ocean liner George Washington sailed for Europe today with Francis R. Sayre and his bride, formerly Miss Jessie Wilson, among the passengers. The couple eloped the newspapermen and photographers to the last. President Wilson, accompanied by his daughter, Miss Eleanor Wilson, arrived at the pier long before the Sayres arrived. The dock was thronged and the president was given an ovation. The Sayres had not arrived and the Wilsons went below and waited. Sayre and his bride boarded the liner before the captain knew of their presence. By mingling with a crowd of second cabin passengers, they slipped aboard the vessel and were not even seen by the reporters. President Wilson left the liner as the band played Mendelssohn's Wedding March. He looked back at the couple several times and grinned. The president planned to return to the home of Col. House in New York by 10:30 o'clock, eat luncheon there and then go to the polo grounds to witness this afternoon's clash between the army and navy football teams. Although the Wilson party attended the theater last night, the president planned to go again tonight, leaving for Washington at midnight.
