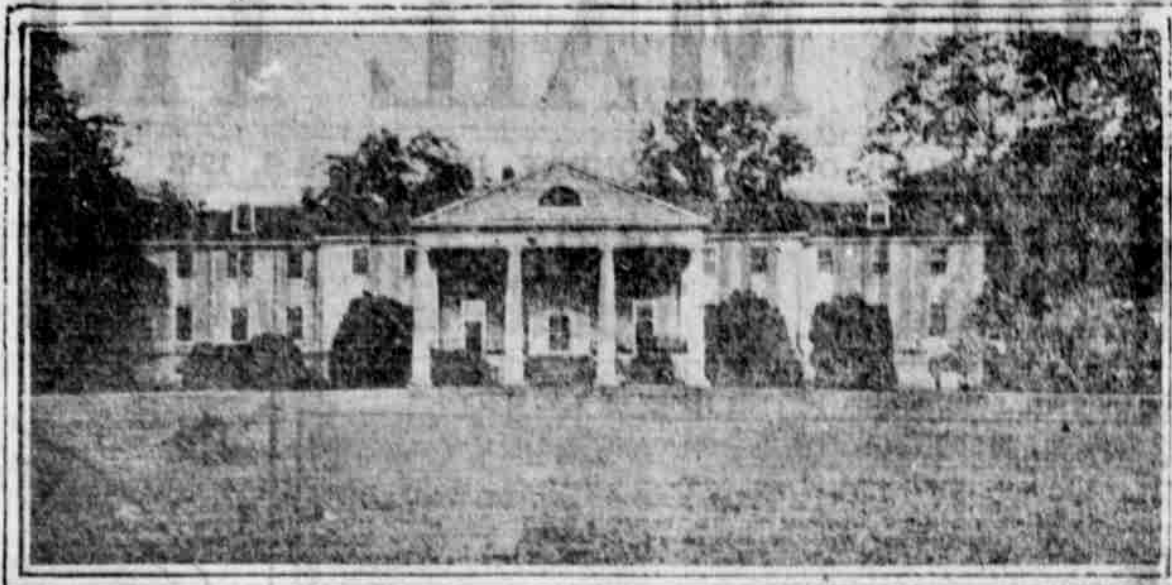

MYRTLE POINT BANK ROBBED

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Dec. 1.—The vault of the State Bank of Myrtle Point, near here was blown open some time between Saturday night and this afternoon, and approximately \$12,000 in gold and currency taken.

The robbery was discovered when the bank was opened for business today. The robbers gained entrance to the bank by cutting away the flooring of an office above. Then drilling a hole into the interior of the vault from the top, the robbers, put in dynamite and blew the safe open.

Several residents of Myrtle Point stated that they believed they heard the detonation of the explosion about 2:30 this morning. No clue was left behind.

UNIFORM SYSTEM RAILROAD ACCOUNTS

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—The United States supreme court sustained today the ruling of the Interstate commerce commission establishing a compulsory uniform system of railroad accounting. The court rendered its decision in a test case brought by the Kansas City Southern Railroad in which it was alleged the commission's order was unreasonable.

The Illinois child labor law, prohibiting the employment of children under sixteen years of age, was declared valid here today by the United States supreme court.

Proceeds from the sale of mines are "taxable income," according to a decision rendered today by the United States supreme court in a test suit instituted by the Stratton Independence company, limited, against Revenue Collector Howbert of Colorado.

REVIVAL SERVICES AT METHODIST CHURCH

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 1.—United States District Judge Van Fleet, with the concurrence of United States District Judge Dooling and Appellate Judge Morrow, upheld here today the constitutionality of the eight-hour law for women, passed by the California legislature.
