LIVESTOCK MARKET HOLDING STEADY

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 1.—Receipts of the week have been cattle, 757; calves, 18; hogs, 4330; sheep, 5144; horses, 103. Cattle market is holding steady for top quality, with steers selling at \$7.50 for best stuff. More medium grade cattle were offered for some time, selling from \$4.50 to \$5.75, with just one lot selling for 6 cents. Prime light calves are worth \$9.00, heavy ones \$6.00 to \$7.75. Bulls featured from \$5.50 to \$6.25. Stags steady. A big run of hogs for the first of the week, but tops still held at 8 cents for three loads Monday and the week closed strong with fifteen loads for the open market and top quality still going at 8 cents and this price is apt to hold until stock show season. The show is held December 8-13 and will attract shippers from the entire northwest and is the largest show ever held west of the Rockies. Sheep receipts were increased from every northwestern state this week, still the sum total was not exceptionally large, but what the run lacked in quantity it made up in quality. Prime ewes brought \$4.00 again and choice wethers \$4.75 to \$5.00 for exceptional quality and lambs elicited a \$6.00 bid with the market closing on a firm basis.

(Continued from page 1.) erty, sought \$4,763,490.20, as against \$3,443,390 in 1914. Two battleships and eight torpedo boat destroyers was the 1915 program offered by Secretary of the Navy Daniels in contrast to the one battleship authorized last year. He asks for beginning this work \$7,800,000, as against \$6,267,500 in 1914. Panama Canal Funds The Panama canal calls for \$26,326,985, as compared to \$21,146,824.38 in 1914. In this estimate is \$2,500,000 for fortifications, providing \$1,300,000 for ten companies of coast artillery. The military establishment demanded \$106,000,000, as compared to \$95,000,000 for 1914, and this included \$150,000 for fifteen aeroplanes. The government's new income tax law will cost \$1,500,000 for assessments and collections. For river and harbor improvements, Secretary of War Garrison asked \$11,400,000, a reduction of \$10,000,000, including the following continuing contracts: Connecting lakes Union and Washington, Seattle, \$375,000. Tillamook bay and bar, Oregon, \$207,000.

SALE OF LANDS IN UMATILLA PROJECT

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1.—In pursuance of the terms of a contract entered into between the government and the Maxwell Land company, of Hermiston, Oregon, Secretary Lane has ordered a public sale of several hundred acres of land embraced within the Umatilla irrigation project. The sale will be held at Hermiston, Oregon, on December 27 and will afford homeseekers an opportunity to secure valuable farms located in the midst of a rapidly growing community. The Umatilla project contains about 20,000 acres of irrigable land, a considerable portion of which today is in a high state of cultivation. The region is most favorably situated for growing a wide variety of crops many of which are high priced. Owing to the low altitude crops mature earlier there than almost anywhere in the northwest, thus insuring a good market for small fruits and vegetables. All indications point to profitable growing of apples, pears, peaches and cherries. Alfalfa produces from four to seven tons, and dairying has become an important industry. The market for all products during the next few years is likely to be first-class, owing to the large number of laborers and stock which will be employed during the construction of the West Umatilla extension, which will require an ultimate investment of \$3,000,000.

The annual report of Secretary Frank Duffy of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters and Joiners of America shows that there are now 1,908 local unions and 218,794 members in good standing.
