### COMMISSIONERS RESIGN TO OUST ONE OF NUMBER

SALEM, Dec. 1.—Asserting that the peculiar temperament of J. Kinney of the State Board of Fish and Game commissioners, and his untiring efforts to impair the usefulness of the board, made it so that they could not see their way clear to continue to serve as members, J. F. Hughes, B. E. Duncan, C. F. Stone and George R. Kelly filed their resignations with Governor West Saturday.

There was a hearing on the alleged unfitness of Kinney. In the hearing the question as to whether the governor has the power to remove Kinney had a prominent part. Attorney McCourt of Portland took the position the governor hasn't the power of removal and that the only place the case can be tried is in the courts. McCourt was given three days to file a brief on the subject.

Kinney is alleged to be financially interested in certain fishing interests in the state and to have attempted to have negotiated for the purpose of certain fishing rights at the mouth of the Rogue river, to have threatened owners of Rogue river properties that if the deal did not go through he might prevent the opening of the river to commercial fishing, to have used his influence to have the governor fail to approve the bill after the Rogue river deal fell through, to have attempted to have a big license fee imposed to embarrass the Rogue river men and to be a trouble maker generally.

All the commissioners took the stand against Kinney, as well as Master Fish Warden Clanton, who testified regarding the constant meddling of Kinney with his employees at hatcheries. Rod Macleay, owner of the Rogue river cannery testified as to Kinney's efforts to hold him up. Governor West also brought out Kinney's letters to Washington thwarting efforts the governor was making in behalf of Oregon at the national capital.

### LONE BANDIT ROBS NAVY POSTOFFICE

BREMERTON, Wash., Dec. 1.—A lone bandit held up and robbed the assistant postmaster in the postoffice here last night. He escaped and is believed to have obtained approximately \$300.  
The assistant postmaster, Harry T. Greenup, went to the postoffice last night to work on his books and get out his monthly reports. About 11 o'clock, according to the report he made to the police, a man broke into the office, overpowered him, tied him to his chair, with a rope and then sacked the safe, which was open, as he had left it when he opened it to get his books.  
After the robber had gone, Greenup worked himself free and rushed to police headquarters and gave the alarm.

### YOUNG DELINQUENTS TAKEN TO SALEM

Beatrice Kavanaugh and Myrtle Hanson, the young girls in the Beggs-Titus-Fuller immorality cases, were committed to the Oregon state industrial school for girls by County Judge Tou Velle this morning, upon the recommendation of Governor West, and over the objections of Charles Kavanaugh, the father.  
The parent appeared before the county court and made an appeal against sending his child to a state institution, tears flowing freely during his argument. He denied the allegation that the home life of Beatrice had not been the best.  
No one appeared to intercede for the Hanson girl, whose mother, Mrs. Mike Spanos, is in northern California.

Lester Hickson, paroled from the court on a horse stealing charge, was committed to the state industrial school, after breaking his parole by stealing a watch from his employer. Judge Tou Velle lectured young Hickson, whose friend he had been, and told him a good, sound strap slashing would be the best for him. He ignored all efforts to help.  
The trio will be taken to Salem tonight.

### SPENT BULLET STRIKES FARMER

Frank Sullinger and Al Seabright were shooting at a target back of the cemetery Sunday. One shot missed the target and sped off, hitting Dan Robinson in the forehead while he was driving a hayrack, half a mile away. The bullet had spent its force, to which Robinson owes his life, and was deflected from a rock.  
The missile struck Robinson just above the eye and stunned him. Dr. R. W. Stearns dressed the wound.

### SAYRE AND BRIDE TO VISIT LONDON

LONDON, Dec. 1.—That Francis B. Sayre and his bride, formerly Miss Jessie Wilson, daughter of President and Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, will come direct to London as guests of Ambassador Page at his home in Grosvenor Square, was the announcement contained in today's London papers. It was not known how long the couple would remain here.

### KLAMATH COUNTY FLYING BLACK FLAG OF REPUDIATION

KLAMATH FALLS, Dec. 1.—The long threatened attack on the credit of Klamath county by some of the great corporations that own timber here and whose officials live in other portions of the United States and are therefore not interested in the development of Klamath, was commenced when a suit was filed Saturday afternoon in the circuit court by Attorneys Kuykendall and Ferguson. These attorneys, it will be remembered, always have been the head and front of the reactionary movement in Klamath county, especially since the voters of the county so thoroughly repudiated Kuykendall's candidacy for the county attorneyship.  
The suit filed yesterday was brought in behalf of R. N. Day, secretary of the Day Bros. Lumber company of New Orleans, owners of some timber in this county. It asks the court to invalidate warrants to the amount of \$298,801.11, which represent expenditures for road work and other work since March 1, 1911.  
The warrants attack all of the so-called involuntary indebtedness incurred by the county court since that date, and are held by a large number of merchants in this city.
