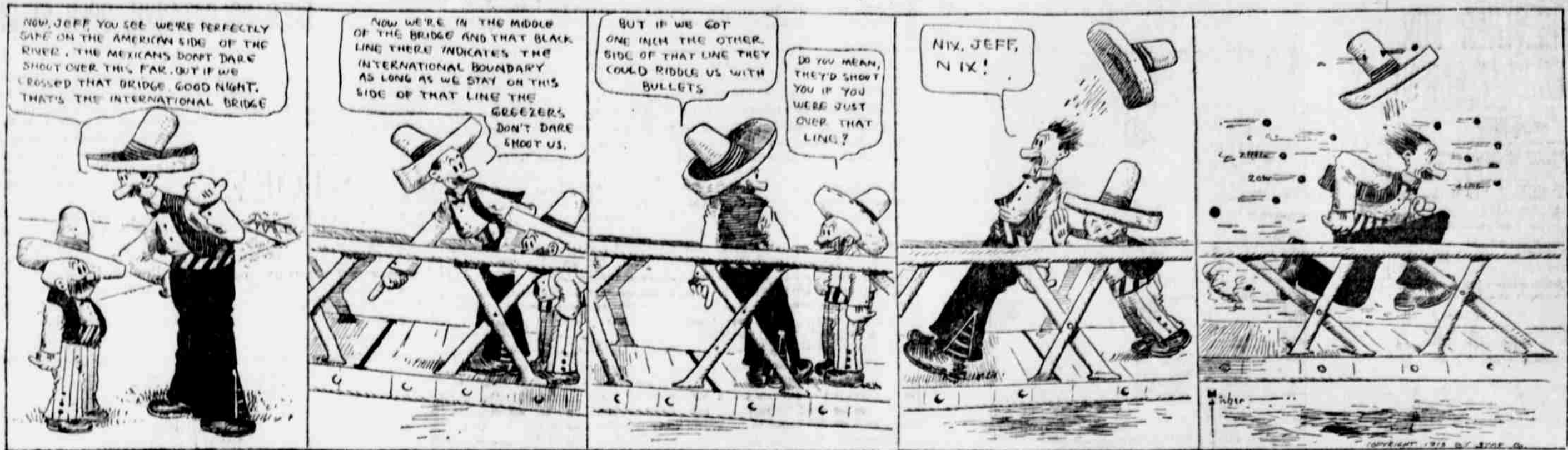

SCHOOL CENSUS SHOW
SLIGHT YEARLY INCREASE

The school census as completed by School Clerk Stine shows 1694 children of school age in Medford, a slight gain over the corrected census of a year ago. The census shows 874 boys, 820 girls. There are more children named Wilson than any name. All the children are white, except one negro and one Jap. Boaty street has the most children in proportion to population.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 2.—Practically a complete count today showed that the amendment to the city charter to prevent the licensing of saloons was passed by a majority of 330 votes at yesterday's election.

This is the second victory for the dry element within a month, the majority for local option being 487 at the election November 4. The only other charter amendment to pass was one providing for a public playgrounds.

The saloon keepers are expected to take legal action to prevent the charter amendment going into effect.
