

ROSEBURG MEETING PLEDGES SUPPORT ASHLAND EXHIBIT

The Medford delegation returned from the Roseburg meeting near midnight, enthusiastic over its success and the hearty reception given by Roseburg. A resolution was adopted favoring a \$25,000 appropriation for an Oregon exhibit at Ashland in 1915, for which assurance has been received that \$25,000 will be advanced by Portland bankers to be reimbursed later. Another resolution pledged the committee to united effort in securing stoppage privilege for all stations on world fair excursion tickets. Another favored a campaign by letter writing through the public schools, rather than by printed literature to invite fair visitors to see the Oregon country.

Eugene was selected as the next meeting place and February 15 set as the date. Enough counties have pledged their support of the Ashland exhibit to secure its passage by the legislature.

Colvig Presiding Officer
The program, consisting of speeches of endorsement for the "Greater Oregon" movement, and dealing on the different phases and problems of the question, was opened by Judge William Colvig of the Commercial club at Medford. Thirty chairs were placed on the platform for the speakers and officials of commercial clubs represented by delegations.

Judge Colvig recited the history of the present movement. He emphasized the need of laying aside sectional differences, of moving together with a loyalty, the power of which comes by the increased numbers. Although a rival of Ashland in many ways, Judge Colvig pointed out that Medford was united in working for the state exhibit at Ashland, which, by its location near the California line, is the gateway to the state for all tourists and travelers.

The welcome to the visitors in behalf of the city was extended briefly in a speech by Mayor Rice. He said the doors of the city are unlocked and the keys thrown away. Following the mayor, Senator Neuner extended a hearty welcome from the Roseburg Commercial club.

Fee Speaks for Railroad

Charles S. Fee, general traffic manager of the Southern Pacific company of San Francisco, who is also a director of the Panama-Pacific exposition, spoke of the effects of the exposition upon the development of this state. The interest of Portland in the general upbuilding of Oregon was explained by Tom Richardson. Others speaking on various phases were: G. F. Johnson of Portland, chairman of the promotion committee of the Oregon Development league; B. R. Greer of Ashland and Arthur Devers of Portland.

Visitors Parade the Streets

The Radiators of the Eugene Commercial club, dressed in attractive uniforms of gray suits with Radiator badges, and colored pennants, and a fine banner, exhibited some funny steps in marching in front of the Commercial club and the postoffice, while the U. of O. band played a number of popular airs. An important feature of the morning was the unheralded arrival and performance of the Rogue River valley band from Central Point. This organization came at their own expense and needless to say their presence added materially to the enthusiastic spirit of the day.

An Auto Parade Followed

On the special train were an Ashland delegation of about 50, bearing the significant badge of the "Gateway City," and delegations from Grants Pass, numbering 40; Central Point, 20; Medford, 20; and Rogue River, 3. Aside from the 150 representatives from Eugene the south-bound special brought fifteen loyal boosters from Cottage Grove. The Portland delegation, who arrived at 5 a. m., together with the people from various county points, places the approximate number of visitors at about 500.

ORDINANCE NO. 739.

A Ordinance to prevent, suppress, and punish gambling, the permitting of gambling and the setting up and carrying on of games and gambling devices in the City of Medford, Oregon.

THE CITY OF MEDFORD DOETH ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. If any person or persons shall, within the City of Medford, deal, play, or carry on, open or cause to be opened, or conduct, either as owner, proprietor or employee, whether for hire or not, any game of faro, monte, roulette, rouge-et-noir, languette, rondo, vintuon (or twenty-one), poker, draw poker, and any banking or any other game played with cards, dice, or any other device, whether the same be played for money, credits, checks or any other representative of value, such person or persons upon conviction before the City Court of a violation of any of the provisions of this section shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the City Jail for not less than two days nor more than fifteen days, or both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 2. If any person or persons, within the City of Medford, suffer or permit any of the acts or things made punishable by section 1 of this ordinance to be carried on in any house, room, shop or other building.

ing or structure, booth or place owned by, or in the possession of, such person or persons, on conviction before the City Court of a violation of any of the provisions of this section, such person or persons shall be punished by a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00, or by imprisonment in the City Jail for not less than two days nor more than 15 days, or by both such fine and imprisonment.

Section 4. It is the duty of the Chief of Police and every policeman to enforce obedience to this ordinance by arresting all persons violating any of the provisions thereof, and taking them before the City Court for trial, and the Chief of Police and any policeman shall have the right to enter any place where he has reason to believe that any game is being conducted or carried on in violation of any of the provisions of this ordinance, and it shall be the duty of any person who is in charge of any such place to at once upon the same for inspection upon the request of the chief, or any policeman. And in case any such person shall refuse to open any such place for inspection at once, upon being so requested by the chief or any policeman, he shall upon conviction thereof be fined in a sum of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$100.00, and in case such fine is not paid he shall be imprisoned one day for every \$2.00 of such fine and be required to labor upon the streets of said City during such period.

Section 5. Any person who shall testify for the prosecution of the person for any of the offenses mentioned in this Ordinance shall have his testimony reduced to writing and no prosecution shall afterwards be brought against him for the particular offense which he testified as a witness.

The foregoing Ordinance was passed by the City Council of the City of Medford, Oregon, on the 2nd day of December, 1913, by the following vote:
