FORGES SENATOR'S NAME.



When Sidney Moulthrop, erstwhile secretary to Senator James Hamilton Lewis, of Illinois, was arraigned before John A. Shields, United States Commissioner, in the Post Office Building, New York, he readily admitted his identity, said he would waive his rights in removal proceedings and was willing to return to Washington to face a charge of forgery. He was arrested on a warrant issued in Washington accusing him of forging the name of Senator Lewis to a check for \$240 and of cashing the check.

GOOD MONEY IN SHEEP ASSERTS WM. LEWIS

Wm. Lewis, who lives two miles north of Central Point, is demonstrating that there is as much money in raising sheep as there is in fruit raising. He shipped two carloads last week, which brought him \$5 hundred weight. They were so fine that the commission man making the sale purchased 50 head of them back from the Union Meat company to fatten for exhibit at the livestock show.

Mr. Lewis will net approximately \$5000 from his sheep and still have 1250 sheep left for next year. His wool crop alone brought him \$1700, in spite of the democratic tariff, and he recently sold 100 ewes to a Trail farmer at \$5 a head.

REGISTRATION FOR CITY ELECTION FRIDAY

Registration for the city election will begin Friday, Dec. 13, and continue for ten days, closing Dec. 23. It means a reversion to the old registration law by virtue of a decision of Attorney General Crawford that the new law was void. All must register to be able to vote, including the 700 Medford citizens who registered before the finding of the attorney general was announced.

The registration board composed of W. T. York, M. A. Rader and F. M. Jordan, representing the three wards will hold forth in the council chambers. Recorder Foss urges that all come early to avoid the eleventh hour rush.

Last year the registration was 2217 for the city election, and it is expected close to this number will be on the books this year.

RADICALS IN CONTROL OF G. O. P. SESSION
