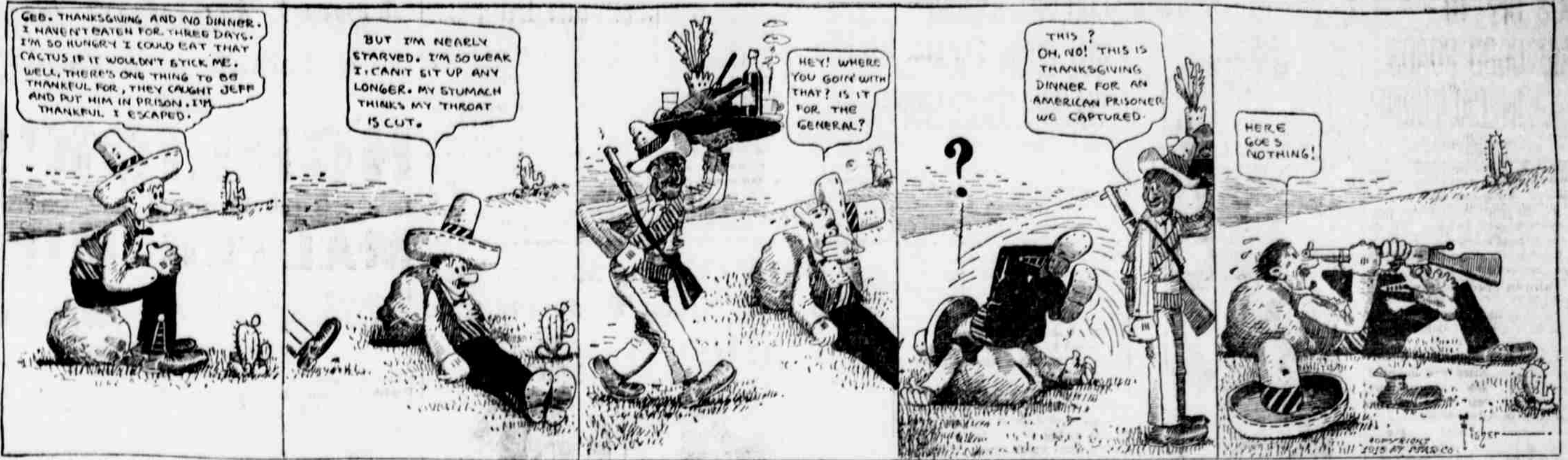


So Saying Mutt Proceeded to Pull the Trigger
