

NO HELP NEEDED ON BURNING STEAMER

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—After being ordered to go to the assistance of the freight steamer Rio Grande, reported by wireless last night, as on fire at sea, the revenue cutter Seminole was recalled today on receipt of a later wireless advises that the Rio Grande was not in need of help. There was no mention in the wireless messages of passengers aboard the Rio Grande.

No word had been received here of the rescue by the steamer Queen of 197 passengers from a burning vessel at sea.

JAPAN'S LAST NOTE RECEIVED NO REPLY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8.—It was inferred in official circles here today that the diplomatic correspondence between Japan and the United States over the California alien law had been exhausted without results and that any action looking to the adjustment of the tangle must come from a new move by one power or the other.

The last note presented by Japan many weeks ago remains unanswered at the state department, for the reason it is said, that despite the numerous changes, the controversy remains where it was in the start.


