HUERTA'S FORCES IN PITIFUL ROUT

PRESIDIO, Texas, Dec. 9.—Complete rout of Huerta's federal army in northern Mexico with frantic flight of his generals for safety on the border, and demoralization of his unpaid troops was established with the arrival today at Ojinaga, Mexico, opposite Piedrito, of civilians and soldiers who deserted Chihuahua.

In the remarkable Hestira which struggled for eight days over a 185 mile trail through the desert and endured great hardships for want of food and water, were General Salvador Mercedo, Huerta's deposed military governor, and commander of the federal troops in the north, Generals Pascual Orozco, Antonio Rojas, Marcello Caraveo, Ynez Salazar and most of the subordinate officers.

Along with them burdened with what property they could carry, came men, women and children representing some of the richest families in the republic.
