

LITTLE ANXIETY FOR EXPLORERS

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 9.—Deputy Minister of Naval Affairs Desharts expressed little anxiety today for the safety of the twenty-five men on Explorer Vilhjalmur Stefansson's ship Karluk when the vessel drifted away in the ice pack while Stefansson, with three of his men and as many more Eskimos, were ashore hunting in west longitude 147, September 20.

The Karluk, Desharts said, appeared, according to the message he received from Stefansson, to have drifted to the westward, though, as it disappeared during a fog, the explorer could not be positive. Those on board the ship, the deputy naval minister added, were well supplied with provisions and undoubtedly would be comfortable until the Karluk could fight free from the ice in the spring and return to civilization.

Stefansson made his way along the coast to Barrow, whence he sent his message overland to Circle to be telegraphed to Ottawa. He was planning an expedition to the MacKenzie river delta at the time.

BRITISH ADVOCATE AMERICAN BOXING

LONDON, Dec. 9.—The American style of boxing and training was urged today by London newspapers in commending on the defeat here yesterday of Bomber Wells, the English heavyweight, by Georges Carpenter of France.

"There is a moral in Wells' defeat," said the London Times. "Until we learn our lesson and take up the style of American athletics we cannot hope to regain our old pre-eminence in the field of sports."

The London Mail said: "Wells' defeat is the Waterloo of English boxing."

"Alas for English boxing," was the way the Telegraph referred to the affair.

SELECTING JURY TO TRY HANS SCHMIDT

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—Selection of a jury to try Hans Schmidt for the murder of Anna Ammiller progressed today more rapidly than had been expected and it was predicted that before adjournment tonight there would be twelve men in the box.

CADILLAC AUTOMOBILE WINS WORLD'S TROPHY

The Cadillac car for the second time has been awarded the celebrated Dewar trophy by the Royal Automobile club of Great Britain.

The former contest that was won by the Cadillac was for standardization.

The trophy was presented this year to the car demonstrating the greatest advance in the industry. Each year these tests for the Dewar trophy take on new conditions and always they include a thorough test of a car's efficiency in the line of normal efficiency grade service.




The second victory for the Cadillac, just announced, was based on a test even more comprehensive than that of complete standardization. It involved the driving of 1000 miles "over give-an-take roads," as phrased in the telegram, the thorough testing of fuel and oil consumption, the recording of the number of times the electric cranking device was used, the duration of the current for lights during and after the run and numerous other practical matters that have to do with efficiency and service.

The contest was conducted with a compulsory average speed of 19.5 miles per hour. Several facts in the Cadillac's record stand out prominently. The gasoline average was 17.17 miles per gallon; the oil consumption 7.4 pints, more than 1000 miles per gallon. Although the electric cranking device was used 130 times during the trial, the engine was turned over 1000 compression strokes at the end of the trial; and, although all the electric lights were on continuously during the road trial for 66 hours and 17 minutes, yet after the 1000 compressions test at the conclusion of the road run, the side, rear and speedometer lights continued to burn for twenty hours.
