

BUD ANDERSON DEFEATS BARRIEAU IN MIGHTY POOR RING EXHIBITION

Canadian Has Best of Fight for Six Rounds and Outboxes Bud, But Collapses Under Kidney Punishment and Takes Count in Tenth.

Both Men Weigh 138 and Are Slow and Clumsy—Bud Loses Several Teeth From Mixing It.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 10.—Bud Anderson remains a candidate for higher pugilistic honors today by virtue of his defeat of Frank Barrieau in the poorest ring exhibition offered at Vernon in many months. Stomach and kidney punches in the tenth round forced Barrieau to the floor, where he gladly listened to the count as it mounted to the "fatal ten."

The little boxing ability that was exhibited during the mill was Barrieau's. For six rounds he kept in front by stabbing Bud with a straight left and occasionally following with a right cross. This treatment strewed several of Bud's best teeth about the canvas, but had no other apparent effect.

Barrieau Wilts in Seventh

Half a dozen sessions exhausted Barrieau's reserve, and in the seventh round he wilted. From there on the end was in sight, and the plodding Anderson, working on Barrieau's lumbar region through the eighth and ninth rounds, soon had his man helpless.

The fight should have been stopped at the end of the ninth round when the bell saved Barrieau, who was stretched out on the canvas. A left to the jaw and a tap on the kidneys, however, put him down again at the beginning of the tenth, and he took the count with his chin on the canvas and his elbows and thumbs elevated.

Anderson did not prove that his operation for appendicitis failed to injure him. He was not compelled to take body punishment and the fast weakening Barrieau offered no test of his strength. Bud was painfully slow and heavy-footed, but his terrific punching ability seemed unimpaired.

Anderson probably will meet Leach Cross, who knocked him out July 4 at Vernon, New Year's day.

Fight by Rounds

Round 1—They came together in mid-ring and traded windmill lefts and rights. Barrieau put two light lefts to the head and Bud missed left and right swings. For the remainder of the round they pushed and shoved about the ring, neither landing effectively. Even round.

Round 2—Barrieau put hard left to the face. They traded lefts and clinched. Bud dug lefts to the ribs and Barrieau had the better of the spirited session of infighting. Bud pursued the Canadian around the ring, but failed to land. Barrieau shot two good lefts to the mouth. Barrieau had a shade.

Round 3—Bud rushed, but was stopped by a straight left and a right to the jaw. Barrieau sent two lefts to the face and crossed with right. Anderson landed hard left to the face. Frank sent two lefts to the face and then crossed with the right again. They traded rights to the head. Anderson sent hard right to the head, forcing Barrieau to cover. Anderson put another right to the head. Even round.


Barrieau Leads Six Rounds

Round 4—Anderson tried to force the going, but Barrieau again played a one-two to the head and repeated. Anderson sent left and right to the stomach. Barrieau scored several clean lefts and rocked Bud's head with right. He was adding to a good point lead and easily had the round.

Round 5—Barrieau continued to box, while Anderson bored in, trying for the stomach and back. Bud landed two hard rights to the kidneys. Frank jabbed lefts to the face. They clinched, and on the break Barrieau sent two left uppercuts to the jaw. Bud put left to the chin and Frank right and left to the face. Bud finished with bloody mouth Barrieau's round.

Round 6—Anderson continued his work on body, but Barrieau straightened him up with left uppercuts. Away from the clinches Bud seemed helpless. Barrieau staggered Anderson with straight left and sent right cross to Bud's sore mouth. They traded left and right at the bell. Barrieau's round.

Round 7—Bud shot heavy left to the stomach. Barrieau falling into a clinch. Bud pounded the kidneys with right and uppercut to the stomach with left. Another left to the stomach took the steam from Barrieau, and he again clinched. This suited Anderson, who flailed kidneys

with terrific rights. Anderson's round.

Bud Keeps Boring In

Round 8—Bud kept boring in with awkward lefts and rights to the body. Frank put left and right to the head, but took jarring left to the stomach and right to the jaw. Anderson avoided a roundhouse left and got to close quarters, jamming three lefts to the wind and showering rights on Barrieau's quivering back. Barrieau was very weak at the bell. Anderson's round.

Both fighters finished their training yesterday. At the close of the day Ritchie weighed 133 3-4. The champion went to the theater last night, arose at 9 o'clock this morning, enjoyed a short walk and then ate breakfast. Dinner is to be served at 4 o'clock this afternoon. Manager Harry Foley figures that this will give the champion time to digest the meal before he steps into the ring.

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RITCHIE FAVORITE IN TONIGHT'S FIGHT WITH MURPHY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 10.—All indications early today pointed to a capacity house at Coffroth's open-air arena tonight when Champion Willie Ritchie of San Francisco defends his lightweight crown against Harlem Tommy Murphy. Although Ritchie reigns a prohibitive favorite at 10 to 4, close students of the game assert the men are evenly matched since the betting price indicates, and a rip-roaring contest is certain. Everyone seems to want to see the bout, but refuses to bet on it.

Both fighters are fit and each is confident of victory.

For the fourteen years that he has been fighting Murphy has always clattered for a match with the champion, and at last he will be given a chance to fulfill his life's ambition. With so much at stake, the Hartmannite, his friends said, would make a better showing against the champion than he did in his two meetings with Ad Wolgast. The odds, against him failed to shake Murphy's confidence and he called attention to the fact that Frankie Burns of Oakland, whom he knocked out several months ago, also was a 10 to 4 favorite.

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Round 9—Anderson opened Barrieau's right eye and the Canadian dropped to the mat from a left to the neck, taking nine seconds. Bud roughed him to the floor again, and the bell prevented a knockout. Blood was streaming from Barrieau's eyes as he crawled to his corner. All Anderson's round.

Round 10—This round was short. Bud sent a light left to the neck on the back and Frank slipped to the canvas and listened to Referee Blahe count ten.
