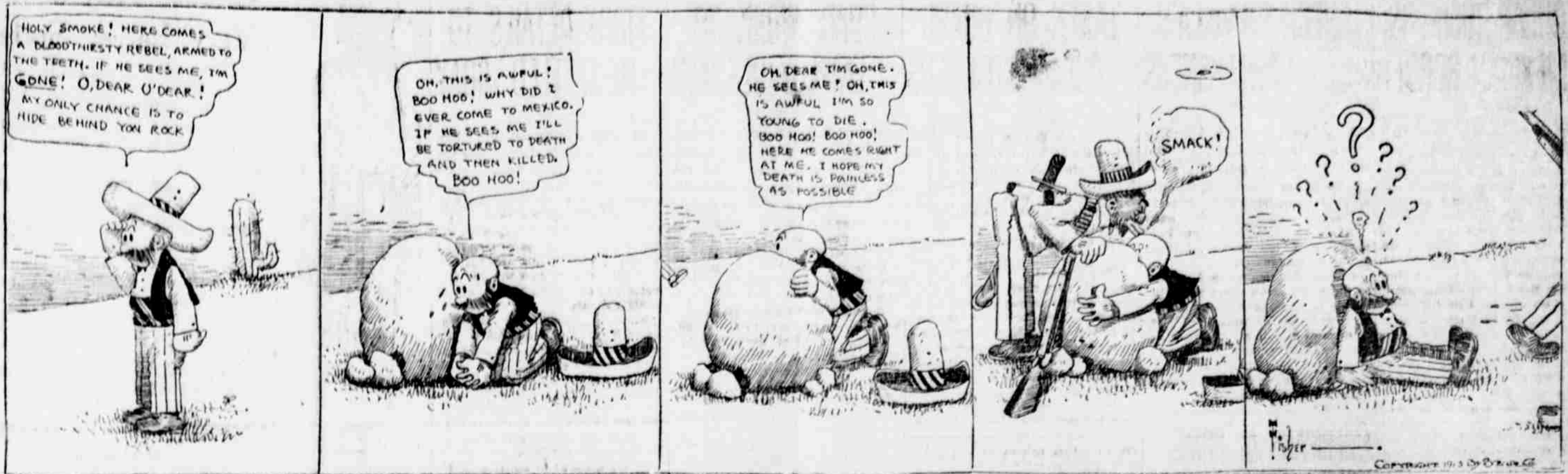

A Simple Home Test for Vinegar

Very often the maker of a home-made cider vinegar desires to know whether or not his product comes within the requirements of the pure food law, but has no way of making an accurate laboratory test to determine the percentage of acetic acid present in it.

weigh carefully one ounce of sodium bicarbonate (common baking soda). Pour the vinegar into a dish which has a capacity of a quart or more. Do not use a metallic container. Then add the sodium bicarbonate slowly to the vinegar, stirring well. Be careful not to add too much at a time or it will effervesce (foam) over the top of the container.

BURNETT IMMIGRATION BILL IS APPROVED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15.—The house immigration committee favorably reported this afternoon the Burnett immigration bill, accompanied by stringent provisions barring all Asiatics, militant suffragettes and advocates of sabotage and anarchism. The measure also includes a literacy test, requiring all aliens to read and write their own language.

His main topic was the great wrong inflicted on the people by the license system, claiming that the supreme court of the United States had decided that no man or set of men had a right to license anyone to commit a crime, and that the licensing of any one to run a saloon was granting him the right to debauch his fellow man. His lecture was interspersed with illustrations and anecdotes that kept the audience constantly interested for an hour and a half. At the close he said that he would not take up a collection, but asked anyone who wished to contribute to come up and lay their contribution on the table, and the result was that \$5 was donated, and he divided it with Rev. Simmons, the pastor of the church. He promised to return in the spring.
