JOSEPHINE'S BOND ISSUE

ON December 31 the people of Josephine county will vote on a road bond issue of \$225,000 bonds bearing The Democratic Times, The Medford Mall, The Medford Tribune, The Southern Oregonian, The Ashland Tribune Stall be expended in building permanent roads, after North Fir street; telephone 78. redeeming outstanding road indebtedness of approxi-

The roads to be improved specified are thirty-three in number, and total \$84,000. This would total, with the warrants to be redeemed, \$209,000, leaving \$16,000 which could not be used, under the law,

It is extremely doubtful whether such a bond issue would be valid, as the county bonding act does not authorize the issuance of bonds for the redemption of outstanding warrants. It provides merely the issuance "for the purpose of raising money to be used for the construction and maintainance of permanent roads"—not of those already constructed.

Only Two Edds Required By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine

This Jelly Roll is fast becoming very popular on account of the way it keeps fresh. With proper handling it should keep fresh a whole week, providing it isn't eaten up in the meantime, for it is every bit as good as it looks.



One cup sifted flour; scant half teaepoonful salt; 2 level teaspoonfuls K C
Baking Powder; grated rind of 1
lemon; 2 eggs beaten light; 1 cup sugar;
y cup hot mild; glass of jelly; powdered sugar.

Beat the sugar into the eggs; add the lemon rind, then the flour, sifted three times with the salt and baking powder; and, lastly, the milk. Bake in a buttered dripping pan; turn out on a damp cloth, trim off the crisp edges; spread with jelly and turn over and over into a roll while still warm. Dredge the top with powdered sugar.
