Pollowing Mercado's deposition Orogeo started contaward with 3000 men. It was believed he planned to join the federals now marching from Torreon against General Villa at Chi-

Sainzar remained in charge at Ojinaga. Mercado, too, was detaine t there, and his friends expressed the fear that Salazar would have him executed.

Mercado was formerly governor of the state of Chihuahua. He was In command of the federal troops at the state capital, Chihuahua City, when the rebels under General Villa cap tured Juarez. When Villa started for Chibushua City, Mercado evacnated the town and led his men, with many non-combatants, on the terrible march across the desert to Olinaga.

Five hundred rebel troops left Juarez today to deal with General Castillo, an independent guerilla, who with, a following of one hundred menwas wrecking the Mexican Northwestcan radiroad between Juarez and Chihuahua City. General Villa was at much pains to put the line in repair and it is essential to his safety to keep it open between his headquarters and the border.
