

CALAMITY HOWL FROM MANN OVER CARABAO PROBE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—A vivid word picture of an industrial tornado which he said was sweeping the country, destroying commerce and prosperity, was painted in the house this afternoon by Representative Mann of Illinois. He warned the democrats that unless they changed their tactics the republicans soon again would be in political control.

"Men are actually starving," said Mann, "while President Wilson is investigating the fun incidental to the Carabao dinner. Municipal lodging houses soon will be in demand everywhere. I am not a calamity hunter, for I have been silent a long time, hoping the clouds would pass by."

Mann cited newspaper articles showing thousands of able bodied men were out of employment in all of the larger cities. He attributed conditions "partly to the tariff bill and partly to the threats of those in political control and to a general lack of capacity on the part of the part of the party in control."

HERZOG TO MANAGE REDS OF CINCINNATI

CINCINNATI, O., Dec. 18.—Chas. Herzog, former third baseman for the New York Giants, was appointed manager this afternoon of the Cincinnati club of the National league. He succeeds Joe Tinker, recently sold to the Brooklyn club at a reported price of \$25,000.

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Letters and telegrams regarding the sale of Joe Tinker by the Cincinnati club to Brooklyn showing that Charles Ebbetts, owner of the Brooklyn team, believed Charles Murphy of the Chicago Cubs had endeavored to get Tinker after he had been purchased by Brooklyn, were given out for publication by Ebbetts here today.

PROSPEROUS YEAR FOR UNION PACIFIC

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—Despite dissolution of the Harriman merger, the Union Pacific has found 1913 a more prosperous year than 1912, according to its latest report, published today.

Earnings, it was stated, were 15.13 per cent on the common stock, as against 13.87 last year. The report showed also increases of \$7, 00,000 gross and \$3,800,000 net in the operating income over 1912.

MEXICAN INSTITUTIONS FACE FINANCIAL RUIN

MEXICO CITY, Dec. 18.—A presidential decree making state bank notes legal tender throughout the republic, and guarantee a fund to be subscribed by the state banks and deposited in the national banks and government guarantee of the bank notes is the program decided upon by the committee of five bankers representing the National Bank, the Bank of London and Mexico, and two or three other concerns which met today with the acting head of the finance department.

The management of the Central Bank exhausted today the reserve of the only three more state banks by an adroit delay in paying.

Long before the regular opening hour a double line of note holders stretched a block from the door. When the bank closed this afternoon those half way in line at the beginning had not reached the window.

Although the Central Bank's difficulties do not concern directly any other bank its inevitable reaction was manifest today particularly in the case of the Bank of London and Mexico, where there was a heavy withdrawal.

NO SPECIAL SESSION ASSERTS GOVERNOR

SALEM, Or., Dec. 18.—Governor West this morning, commenting on the statements of Speaker McArthur and others, that a special session of the legislature would be necessary to straighten out the registration laws that now require the county clerk to have the registration books open at their offices on May 15, and at the same time have them in the hands of the election boards, said:

"If anything is the matter with the election laws, so that it would prevent an election, it would prevent the election of another legislature, and that would be a Godsend. If there would be no election, all officers would hold over, and all things continue as they are, for, under a recent opinion of the attorney general, all would continue to hold office and none could resign until their successors were elected and qualified; there will be no special session to remedy the conflict of the laws."

RAPID PROGRESS ON CADILLAC GARAGE

Contractors Priddy and O'Brien are making rapid progress on the Cadillac garage on South Fir street, being built for Court Hall by Charles Palm. The building will be a two-story structure and one of the finest garages in the city. It will house the taxicabs, the Crater Lake auto stages as well as transient autos.

The same contractors recently finished the home of the Medford sheet iron works on North Fir. In fact, they might be said to have built most of Medford's business district, having erected a majority of the brick structures.

George O'Brien, who left last spring for Santa Barbara and other California points, has returned to remain in Medford, satisfied that no small city in the country has a better future.

DECLARES EXTINCTION OF POTATO PROBABLE

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Declaring the potato is threatened with extinction, Congressman Lindquist of Michigan today asked the agricultural department to extend the diseased potato embargo to every country where the potato disease has ever existed. He charged that potato dealers were trying to end the embargo for speculative purposes.

Turns Demands Down

He listened quietly to their demands, then replied that he intended to "see that law continued to be enforced in the strike zone just as it has been."

In his turn, he demanded that the trades unionists submit their grievances in writing. Their spokesman instantly complied. Then the executive asked for proof.

Andrew Colnar, a striker who spent some time under military arrest, promptly got up and recited his experiences.

The soldiers took him from jail, he said, handed him a shovel and ordered him to dig his own grave. He worked, he declared, until he was exhausted, fainting repeatedly from fright and weariness, while the militiamen prodded him with bayonets to keep him awake by bayonet thrusts. Finally, to his amazement, the officer in charge told him it "was all a joke" and he was released.

Executive Listens Patiently

To this and other stories the governor listened patiently. He would investigate them, he promised. In conclusion, he protested against the resolution adopted last night in favor of his recall.

The convention met this afternoon to discuss the executive's reply. The delegates made no pretence of being satisfied with it.

COAST GRIEVANCES AGAINST JAPS AIRED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—Hearings on the Raker bill, wherein Pacific coast residents will be permitted to air their grievances against Japanese and other Asiatics will start January 22, according to announcement made here this afternoon by the house immigration committee. The Raker bill is intended to exclude all such aliens. Raker expected delegations from Seattle, San Francisco and Portland to attend.

WANT MONUMENTS FOR PEACE CENTENARY

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18.—A bill appropriating \$500,000 for erecting in every state bordering on Canada, a monument commemorating 100 years of peace with England was introduced in the senate today by Senator Jones of Washington.

JAIL DYNAMITED BY SUFFRAGETTES

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Two explosions this evening shattered the windows of houses opposite Holloway jail, where London's suffragette prisoners usually are kept. Suffragette bombs were supposed to have done the damage. How badly the jail was damaged could not be learned, as the police surrounded it immediately and prevented investigation.

PLAN TO DYNAMITE DEN OF RATTLESNAKES

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Dec. 18.—A den of rattlesnakes, supposed to contain thousands of the reptiles, is to be dynamited to get rid of them in a bunch, if plans of the city water department are carried out.

The snakes' den is above the Morena dam site, sixty-five miles from this city, and is in the way of men working to develop the watersheds. The workmen report that snakes are particularly dangerous this year, giving little or no warning with their rattles.

ARREST GIRL HOBO DRESSED MALE ATTIRE

OAKLAND, Cal., Dec. 18.—Ella Lowellyn, 18, giving her home as Stockton, was arrested as she left a train here today, clothed in male attire. She left her home last Tuesday and was attempting to beat her way to Portland, Oregon, where she says she was to enter a nurses' training school.
