**La Follette's Amendments**

One, providing that no United States senator or representative may be a reserve board member, a reserve bank director or a member bank officer or director, was incorporated in the bill without a rollcall.

The second, providing that no reserve board member or regional or member bank officer or director may be an officer or director of any other bank, trust or insurance company, was voted down, 51 to 30.
