BAKER, Ore., Dec. 23.—Sheriff Rand today flatly refused to carry out Governor West's order to close the saloons at Copperfield and said the only way he knew for the governor to have his wishes carried out was to declare martial law at Copperfield and take in the militia. Sheriff Rand declares that the district attorney has advised him there is no law which would warrant his closing the saloons which have licenses and there fore must the peremptory order received today go unobeyed. Rand telegraphed Governor West today asking him to cite the code under which he expected his order to be obeyed and said until he gets a satisfactory answer he will make no move.

Doughnuts That will remain moist.

Every housewife who bakes her own bread knows that if a little potato is added to the sponge, the bread will not dry out as quickly. In this recipe potato is utilized to make doughnuts that will remain moist and fresh for several days.

K C Potato Doughnuts

By Mrs. Nevada Biggs, of Baking School fame.

3/4 cups flour; 2 eggs; 1 cup sugar; 1 level teaspoonful K C Baking Powder; 1/2 teaspoonful salt; 1/2 teaspoonful spice; 1 cup cold mashed potato; 1/2 cup milk, or more if needed.

Sift three times, the flour, salt, spice and baking powder. Beat eggs with rotary beater, then still using rotary beater, gradually add sugar, then work in the mashed potato with a spoon and alternately add milk and flour mixture. Make a soft dough, roll into a sheet, cut into rounds, pinch a hole in the center with the finger and fry in deep fat.

Fat for frying should not be hot enough to brown the doughnut until it has risen. When the doughnut is dropped into the fat it sinks to the bottom. As soon as it comes up it should be turned and turned a number of times while cooking. This recipe is excellent as they do not take the fat in frying and will stay moist for days.
