

HOPEFUL TONE ON STOCK MARKET

NEW YORK, Dec. 23.—Early trading in stocks was active today, with a firm undertone. The market here disregarded lower prices in London before trading began here, and the big gains of the last few days were held well. Steel and Harriman stocks were particularly strong. Canadian Pacific was an exception, opening at 213, ex rights, a decline of 3 points from last night's close. White traders generally were cautious and took profits rather than carry over large amounts of stock; the tone was distinctly hopeful. Around noon there was a general reaction, and quite a long list of stocks fell back to or below the opening level. Those included Western Union, Missouri Pacific, New Haven and Can.

Bonds were irregular. The market closed dull.

FIND WOMAN FROZEN IN MISSISSIPPI ICE

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., Dec. 23.—Standing statue-like in the ice of the Mississippi river and half a block from a big municipal Christmas tree, the body of a well-dressed woman, about 35 years old, was found frozen here today.

The woman evidently had jumped from the bridge which spans the river at a point near where the body was found. She broke through the ice as far as the waist and died from exposure. One arm was broken. The other was extended above the head as if she had been gesturing and calling for help when overcome.

Firemen were compelled to chop the body from the ice. The woman wore a large cameo pin and expensive furs and silks.

JACK SPRECKLES SAYS HE'S MODEL HUSBAND

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 23.—Through his attorney, Samuel Shadridge, John D. Spreckles junior, filed here today an answer to the divorce application filed recently by his wife, Mrs. Edith Marie Spreckles.

According to his answer Spreckles was a model husband. He denied that he ever inflicted either mental or bodily injuries upon Mrs. Spreckles; that he ever made remarks calculated to wound; that he was quarrelsome; that he stayed away from home at night, or that he had ever humiliates his wife in the presence of friends.

Spreckles asked that Mrs. Spreckles application be dismissed.

HUGE WAVE WASHES OUT MILE OF BEACH

PORLAND, Ore., Dec. 23.—A huge wave, coming out of the stormy Pacific, yesterday swept more than a mile of beach at Elmwood Park, in Tillamook county, washing out several hundred feet of the Southern Pacific railroad track, undermining the foundations of a number of dwellings and doing other damage, according to reports brought here today. The monetary loss will not be great.

The wall of water swept nearly a mile inward from the beach.


DECEMBER MORN ON MEDFORD STREETS
