SUSPECT CHARGE WITH MURDER

Bostick Fails to Prove Alibi and Is Identified as Bandit Who Held Up Southern Pacific and Killed Traveling Passenger Agent.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 24 .-A formal charge of murder was lodged here today against John Bostick, the Southern Pacific robber suspect. He was charged with shooting and killing Traveling Passenger Agent Horace E. Montague on December 1, the day the Southern Pacific's train was held up at El Monte. near Los Angeles.

The "alibi" on which Bostick relied to establish his innocence was shattered today. He had claimed that he was at work at the Southern Pacific roundhouse here on the day of the hold-up. H. H. Carman, foreman of the Southern Pacific shops, was brought before Bostick this morning.

Alibi Is Failure "Did you ever see this man before " Bostick was asked.

"I never did," was the answer. Bostick paled when told who Carman was but remained silent.
