MRS. MARTHA BROWN, PIONEER OF '52, DEAD

Died, at Brownsboro, December 23, Mrs. Martha M. Brown, aged 74, widow of Henry Brown, founder of Brownsboro, a pioneer of Jackson county, who came here with her husband in 1852. She leaves four children, three daughters, Mrs. L. C. Charley, Mrs. Mary Terrill and Mrs. Eugene Charley, and one son, Geo. B. Brown, of Brownsboro. The funeral will be held at 11 o'clock Friday morning, December 26, at Brownsboro schoolhouse, Rev. L. L. Simmons officiating. Interment at Brownsboro cemetery.

Mrs. Brown was the last of the pioneers of '52 who came to Jackson county and played a leading role in its development.

PARIS' NEW COMBINATION COSTUME



The popularity of the dantesque was foreseen by the Parisian modistes, and their ingenuity was taxed to fashion a suitable costume—a gown that could be worn in the afternoon for shopping, calling or walking, and at the tea hour for dancing. The costume in the accompanying sketch is the result of one modiste's endeavors and answers all the purposes required. The waist and skirt proper are made of a beautiful quality of clinging black velvet. A soft black taffeta is used for the bodice and tunic and were it not for a slight fullness where the tunic is gathered on to the bodice, the dividing line could scarcely be noticed. This same fullness gives the peg top effect to the skirt and a Persian influence is added by the shape of the tunic, which is longer at the sides than in front. The little yoke and ruffing around the sleeve ends are of white chiffon. DE VILLIERS KILLED BY UNKNOWN PERSON

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Dec. 24.—Daniel De Villiers, wealthy Texan and Boer war veteran, who was shot and killed Monday while fighting with Roy Glover, in Glover's home, came to his death by a shot from a gun in the hands of an unknown person, according to a verdict returned today by a coroner's jury.

De Villiers was trying to see his former wife, who is now Mrs. Glover, when the shooting occurred. Attorneys for Glover, who is a realty dealer, contend that De Villiers went to the Glover's home armed and say that they will prove this point if their client is prosecuted in connection with the affair.

DARING STEEPLEJACK DYING AT SAN FRANCISCO

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 24.—Olaf Czarnowski of New York, known throughout the country as one of the most daring of steeplejacks, was reported dying at the Emergency hospital here today. He was found on the first floor of the addition being built to the St. Francis hotel with a fractured skull and broken arm and leg. It was not known how he met with his injuries.

TRAIN ROBBER SUSPECT CHARGE WITH MURDER

Bostick Fails to Prove Alibi and is Identified as Bandit Who Held Up Southern Pacific and Killed Traveling Passenger Agent.

Diamond Ring Recovered That Was Stolen From Woman Who Identified His on Street.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Dec. 24.—A formal charge of murder was lodged here today against John Bostick, the Southern Pacific robber suspect. He was charged with shooting and killing Traveling Passenger Agent Horace E. Montague on December 1, the day the Southern Pacific train was held up at El Monte, near Los Angeles.

The "alibi" on which Bostick relied to establish his innocence was shattered today. He had claimed that he was at work at the Southern Pacific roundhouse here on the day of the hold-up. H. H. Carman, foreman of the Southern Pacific shops, was brought before Bostick this morning.

Alibi Is Failure
"Did you ever see this man before?" Bostick was asked.

"I never did," was the answer. Bostick paled when told who Carman was but remained silent.

Sheriff Hammel of Los Angeles arrived here today. He is confident that Bostick is the bandit, and declared he probably would take him to Los Angeles tomorrow afternoon. Hammel wanted to leave this afternoon but Captain of Detectives Moonsey would not consent to this, as he wished to make a further investigation here.

Bostick gave his age today as 22 and said he was from Iowa.

Diamond Ring Found
A diamond ring recovered from a pawn shop on a ticket found in the suspect's pocket was positively identified this afternoon as the stone taken from Mrs. Arthur Colen. It was Mrs. Colen who recognized Bostick on the street and caused his arrest. If the postal authorities are satisfied that Bostick is the train-robber Mrs. Colen may collect \$7000 in rewards in addition to the \$5000 offered by the Southern Pacific company.

Dr. A. B. Clarke of Honolulu, a passenger on the Southern Pacific's Overland train held up near Richmond, Cal., November 14 last, identified Bostick this afternoon as the man who did that job.

Dr. Clarke was a passenger in the Pullman car Amazonia when the robber thrust a gun within a foot of the former's head and demanded his money. The bandit was unmasked.

"I am positive that Bostick is the man," Dr. Clarke said. "There can be no mistake about it."
